#### **Member Portrait**

Every month we will be introducing you to one of your fellow Camera Club Members. Carole Bailey, your newsletter editor, volunteered to be the first.

This will be my third year with the Menomonee Falls Camera Club. I also joined the Wehr Nature Center Camera Club about a year and a half ago. Both clubs offer me different experiences and I plan on staying active with both clubs.

This position of Newsletter writer is the first position I've held in either Camera Club.

Two years ago, I saw the notice about the MFCC in the Menomonee Falls Recreation brochure. It made me think that perhaps photography might be a fun hobby for when I retire in a few years. So I came to the club to see what it was all about. It seemed interesting, so I bought a 'starter' 35m camera and began taking photographs late in 2000.

In addition to belonging to the 2 camera clubs, I started taking introductory photo classes at UW\_Waukesha, and also have attended a few day-long seminars in the area. I am still learning how to use my camera and trying not to get too discouraged with my slow progress. For now, I am taking mostly nature shots using 35m slide film.

## **Back to the Basics**

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This month we will discuss how to mark your slide and print entries for competition.

#### SLIDES:

Mark a "thumbspot" (a dark circle - I like the little 1/4 inch dots I bought at the map store) on the lower left corner of the slide as you view it. (Normally the shiny side of the slide.) On this same side, put the title and the Class and Category codes (depending upon the competition).

On the other side put your name and address. (Tiny return address labels (Avery 5267—1/2 X 1-3/4) work reasonably well. You should

also include your club name for WACCO competitions.

#### PRINTS:

The new WACCO rules call for 3 size mats or boards: 8x10, 11x14, and 16x20.

Large prints (color or monochrome) must measure larger than 8x10 and be mounted on the 16x20 mat or board. Small prints can be any size from 3x5 up to 8x10 and must be mounted on either a 8x10 or 11x14 mat or board.

On the back clearly mark your name, address, and print title. Also place a large and dark arrow pointing the 'up' direction for the print. Please make sure that this arrow is

easily visible in the darkened room where these prints are judged.

#### OTHER COMPETITION RULES:

Some competitions have rules different than stated here. Read all information that is with the competition announcement to be sure that you follow directions.





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Don and Jeff will help you with any questions you may have either during the presentation or during the shoot.

We expect to be at the museum for one and a-half to two hours. Of course you can stay longer if you desire. For those who want to join us, we plan to have lunch at the Mine Shaft, a popular restaurant in Hartford.

The museum is inside so you will want to use a flash. If you have a tripod you will want to bring it. You also may find a telephoto lens useful.

Jyoti is a brand new member. He has been taking photographs for 25 years. His primary interest is nature photography using 35mm slide and color film. Welcome Jyoti!

Virginia is our current President. She has been with our club since September 1999. She began pursuing photography as a hobby about 3-1/2 years ago. She spent 18 years working in the cosmetic industry doing product promotion, before/after glamour photo sessions and product display. But never behind the camera. These experiences increased her interest in visual imagery. So in June of 1999 she took a basic photography class through a local recreation department, and was on her way. She prefers 35mm prints and slides. She also does a little digital, "...because I feel it being forced upon me.". Her favorite subjects are table-top and working with models.

## Back to the Basics

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Composition: Purpose and Message.

As photographers, we all want our viewers to be interested in our photographs, so we need to give them something to be interested in.

A lot of people own cameras, but few are good photographers. Most take 'pictures' to record events: birthdays, vacations, kids growing up, family pets, etc. They are interested in these photographs because of the personal history they record. But others not as emotionally involved in the events may not be as interested. Ever sit through rolls and rolls of a friend's vacation showing various family members in front

of famous landmarks? Not terrifically exciting.

To compose a photograph that will be interesting to your viewers, you need to ask yourself "What is the purpose of this photograph? What point am I trying to get across to my viewers? What story am I trying to tell? What feeling am I trying to convey?" If you cannot answer these questions, then maybe you need to rethink your shot.

Once you have decided on the purpose of the photograph, then you need to determine how best to get that message across to your viewers. What do you include in the frame? What do you exclude? Do you fill the frame or do you leave 'empty' space to convey a certain feeling? Do you limit your depth of field to minimize the background or

foreground, or do you want everything in focus? From what perspective do you shoot? Once you have decided the purpose of your photograph, these choices should be fairly easy.

I am reminded of a story about an old wood carver. When asked how he turns a hunk of wood into a duck, he replied "Why, I just cut away the pieces that don't look like a duck." And that's what we photographers need to do, too.

His advice to the rest of us is "never turn your passion into your livelihood". To quote Tom, "This may sound strange at first glance; however, take it from someone who's done it with his passion. It would be ok if you got to do the stuff you like even most of the time. The sad reality is that it turns into a JOB that sooner of later you will lose the drive and passion you once had."

Tom tries to always have a camera with him to capture moments that otherwise would be lost to him. He has missed opportunities in the past and does not want that to happen again.

#### Back to the Basics

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Composition: Orientation and Placement.

When I refer to 'orientation', I mean whether the frame is taken horizontally or vertically. These are also sometimes referred to as landscape and portrait. The horizontal format can project a feeling of peace or serenity. The vertical format projects more majesty or strength. However, the frame needs to fit the subject. We often think that tall obiects will fit better in the vertical and wide objects will work better in the horizontal. But don't just automatically use that framing. When setting up a shot, try both the horizontal and vertical orientation. You might find a whole new feeling using the oppo-

site orientation.

The point of interest in your photograph should, for the most part, be placed using the 'rule of thirds'. The one exception to this is in architecture. There the rule is to center the architectural feature that you are shooting. However, as creative photographers, we break these rules as often as not. But we do need to be aware of what we are doing.

When shooting something in action, be that a bird flying, a person running, or a police car racing with its lights flashing, we need to make sure that there is room in the frame for that action to continue.

When setting up shots of people in scenic places, consider having the people face towards the scenic point

of interest instead of facing towards the camera. You will get a more cohesive and natural-looking photograph.

Selecting your orientation to fit the subject and feeling you want to convey and placing your objects in psychologically comfortable positions within your frame should result in pleasing photographs.

#### **Back to the Basics**

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Composition: Lighting.

The word "photography" means "writing with light". Light is critical to taking good photographs

Light can be either natural, from sunlight or moonlight, or artificial, from man-made lighting. Each different type of light source produces a different quality of light.

In addition to the source, there are 4 main types of lighting:

Front lighting is probably the most common. This is where the light source comes from behind the camera and shines on the subject. This often gives the best colors and provides few shadows.

Back lighting is where the light

## **Composition: Lighting**

source comes from in front of the camera and the subject is between the light and the camera. This normally results in your subject being a silhouette, but can be effective, especially with translucent subjects, such as leaves and stained glass.

Side lighting is where the light source comes from one side or in some cases from both sides. This will produce exaggerated shadows and a great deal of textural information.

Most photographers prefer diffused lighting such as you get on an overcast day or in the shade. This eliminates harsh shadows and will produce a more subtle result.

I found an excellent quote in John Hedgecoe's "New Introductory Photography Course" - "Contrary to popular opinion, a sunny day does not guarantee good pictures. The art of photography depends on the quality of light, not the quantity. It is the direction of light that counts, and how much it is diffused—how shadow falls on a subject, how the light affects the intensity of its colors, and the level of detail that the light reveals."

## **Back to the Basics**

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Composition: Simplify.

One of the most common errors novice photographers make is including too much in their photographs. Our basic instinct is to include what we see. But this often results in a cluttered and busy photograph where too many elements compete with our 'center of interest'. We need to identify what we want as our main subject and then work to eliminate the extraneous elements. There are several ways we can do this.

We can eliminate competing elements by filling the frame with our subject. We do this by moving closer or by using a telephoto or macro lense. This can be very effective, especially when our center of interest is a discrete object, like a flower, or a portion of

ject, like a flower, or a portion of the whole, like architectural details.

However, in some cases we do want to keep the surrounding elements to create the mood or sense of location. But we need to do something to keep them from distracting the viewer. We can do this by using focal length to place foreground or background non-essential elements out of focus. This can be particularly effective for portraits of people or animals, or for outdoor scenes with disruptive elements, like

signs, utility poles, or foreground foliage.

Painters create their art by continually adding elements to their blank canvas until they get the result they want. We, as photographers, already start with everything. And what we need to do is eliminate elements until we have the result we want.

Every month we will be introducing you to one or two of your fellow Camera Club Members. This month's portrait is Ed Kolinski.

Ed has been with our club since 1985. He also currently belongs to the Wehr Nature Center Club and the Riveredge Camera Club (Photographers Anonymous). He was president of the Wehr Nature Center Club for 3 years and the President of the former Schultz Audubon Camera Club. He is also on the WACCO Board of Directors as a delegate.

He has been taking photographs for 25 years. He was an oil and water color artist and took photographs to use as models for his painting. Over time he discovered that he enjoyed the taking photographs as much as the painting. So now he mostly just takes photographs.

He shoots 35m film, both prints and slides, color and black & white. He prefers nature subjects, macro photography of wildflowers, insects and fungi, landscapes and seascapes.

His advice to all of us is: Enjoy the joys of photography; enjoy the beauty of nature. And give back more than you get!

#### **Back to the Basics**

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Design: Perspective.

The real world is 3-dimensional, but photographs are only 2-dimensional. One of the challenges of a photographer is to help the viewer replace the missing 3rd dimension, depth. Perspective is the technique we can use to do this.

Perspective indicates how close or how far away objects are from us and from each other. When our eyes see these visual hints, our minds then fill in the assumptions of depth that the perspective suggests.

There are five different perspective techniques that photographers can use:

Linear perspective is perhaps the

most common. Lines that we know to be parallel appear to get closer together as they get further away. We see this used often with roads, paths, and architectural structures.

<u>Diminishing scale</u> refers to similar objects looking smaller the further away they are. This technique is most effective when photographing multiple objects equally distant from each other, like telephone poles or fence posts.

<u>Selective focus</u> can be used to place some objects out of focus by using a wide aperture. The resulting difference in sharpness suggests that the objects are different distances from the viewer.

Aerial perspective is caused by atmospheric conditions like fog, rain, or haze. Objects closer to the lense

appear sharper and more colorful than those in the distance.

The last perspective technique is overlapping forms. Objects closer to the lense will partially cover objects behind it. The viewer will then perceive the obscured objects as being further away.

We can use each of these techniques separately or together to convey the illusion of depth, thereby bringing our photographs to life.

Richard has been with our club since it was formed 27 years ago. He is also a member of the Wehr Nature Center Camea Club, Riveredge Photographers Anonymous, and a member of the Wisconsin Chapter of PSA. He is currently the VP at Wehr and Chairman of the Youth Photography Showcase. Wisconsin Chapter PSA.

His interest in photography started over 50 years ago when he started taking pictures of people with a small plastic camera. He got his first 35mm camera at 15 (an Argus C3), then graduated to a 2-1/2 twin lens reflex Minolta Autocord as a high school Junior. He currently is shooting Nikon and Minolta, and Nikon Digital.

His favorite subject is nature, mostly scapes and close-ups, but lately his interests have returned to people and everyday objects.

His advice to aspiring photographers is to shoot for yourself, shoot what you like, what appeals to you, not what might appeal to judges. Study the masters and you'll find a number of great pictures where all of the 'rules' were broken. Most important is light: quality, quantity, and direction. Most of all, have fun!

## **Back to the Basics**

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Design: Leading Lines.

One method of drawing attention to the object of a photograph is the use of leading lines. Lines can be found just about everywhere: roads, buildings, fences, and rivers are the most common. The viewer's attention is naturally drawn along these lines. They can pull together the background and foreground, and add interest to the photograph.

But make sure that these lines lead into the picture and not out of it. When there are strong lines in a photograph that lead out of the frame, the viewer's eye naturally follows the line right out of your photograph. Which may not be what you want.

Different lines evoke different feelings. Vertical lines suggest strength and dignity. Horizontal lines are more serene and peaceful. Diagonal lines suggest motion or action. And curved lines are graceful or charming.

Placing leading lines in your photograph that divide the area unequally creates a more pleasing photograph. (That's why we try to never put the horizon in the middle of the photograph.) The more interesting portion of your photograph should be in the lar-

ger area. Move yourself around until the lines in your photograph are lined up to focus attention where you want it to be.

And one last caution about leading lines. Remember that our eyes are used to reading (and seeing) things left to right. You want any leading lines in your photograph to work with this, not against it.



## **Back to the Basics**

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Design: Shapes

Of all of the components of photographic design, perhaps shape is the most basic. Our minds can recognize most objects by shape alone, even if the coloring, texture, and details have been muted or even eliminated. Some of the more dramatic photographs I've seen are silhouettes: animals, plants, trees, or people that are back-lit or side-lit. All of the distracting elements are eliminated, allowing the eye to focus solely on the shape of the subject.

But silhouettes are not the only way in which we can use shapes to improve our photographs. To emphasize the shape of an object, shoot low to frame the subject against the sky. Or use a shorter focal length to put the background out of focus. Either technique will eliminate distracting elements and allow the shape of your subject to dominate.

We can also use the contrast between the shape of our subject and the shape of the background to make our photographs more interesting. For example, a human shape can be more dramatic when photographed in front of geometric shapes (buildings) than when photographed in front of other people.

Our eyes tend to group objects of like shape together. So we can use repeating shapes, of same or different sizes, to create a sort of 'visual motion' to guide the viewer's eye

through our photograph. The similar shapes can be either the subject of the photograph (like a school of fish) or they can be used to direct attention towards the subject (like a row of formal columns leading into a garden).

Shapes are everywhere. We have to learn to recognize them and to use them to improve the impact of our photographs.

He does all of his own monochrome printing, and is now exploring the world of digital imaging. Landscapes and portraits are his favorite subject.

#### **Back to the Basics**

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Design: Color.

Of all of the design elements of a photograph, it is perhaps color that produces the greatest emotional response from the viewer.

Some colors attract more attention than others. Bright primary colors, especially reds, are seen even if they cover only a small area of the image. Other colors, especially blues, tend to retreat in the picture and do not command the viewer's attention.

The combination of colors that you decide to include in your photograph will determine the message that you send to your viewers. If you include lots of bright, contrasting colors, it will create the perception of excitement,

movement, or chaos. (Think circus parade, kids in brightly colored clothes on a playground.) If you include different hues of the same color family, you will create a more peaceful scene. (Think sunsets with their oranges or pinks, or early morning misty scenes with their grey greens.) If you include a bright splash of color in an otherwise more muted scene, it will automatically make the bright colored object the center of attention. (Think a pink flower in a white flower garden, or a bright yellow-gold fish in a blue-green pond.)

There are a few things you need to know about color before you can master using color in the design of your photographs:

 A color will appear more intense when surrounded by a darker contrasting color and less intense when surrounded by a paler hue.

#### Design: Color

- Warm colors (reds, oranges, bright pinks) seem to come forward towards the viewer. Cooler colors (blues, greens) seem to recede.
- 3. Colors are usually much more intense in digital images.

So for all of us who are color photographers, it is important that we recognize that our use of color will greatly affect the impact our images have on our viewers.

#### **Member Portraits**

Every month we will be introducing you to one or two of your fellow Camera Club Members. This month's portrait is Jon Moscicki.

Jon has been a member of our club for over 20 years. He has served as President twice, Vice-President, Treasurer, and did our newsletter for 3 years.

He has been taking photographs for about 40 years. He started when he was working on his high-school newspaper. Later he started assisting a fellow photographer at weddings, and over time became the primary photographer at weddings. This allowed him to use his skills and all of his photographic equipment. He also pulled his son into wedding photography with him and they became a well-tuned team. He has many fond memories of working weddings with his son.

He prefers digital and medium format. His favorite subjects (surprise here) are weddings and churches.

As one of our in-club digital experts, he feels that digital has opened a whole new world for him. He feels that he is finally able to get the results he has always strived for.

#### Back to the Basics

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is Design: Texture.

Touch is an important part of how we experience the world around us. If we can include some visual sense of touch in our images, we can create photographs that will be more interesting to the viewer. The way we do this is by adding texture. Texture can be defined as the visual interpretation of the tactile surface characteristics of an object. What this means, in English, is catching the shadows and light of a surface so that the viewer can imagine what it would be like to touch.

All objects have surfaces that can be very interesting. Some textures can tell us the age of an object (think rust, peeling paint, an old woman's hands), some can tell us the hardness or soft-

ness of an object (think rocks, dandelion puffs, a sand beach), and some can tell us the roughness/smoothness of the object (think sandpaper, rough bark, marbles). We can include these textures as part of our image, or as the main subject.

The best way to highlight the texture of any surface is to use a light source from the side, rather than straight-on. The side light will emphasize the shadows, angles, curves, and highlights of any surface. This will help to add that 3rd dimension to the image that we had mentioned in an earlier column, and will help to make the image 'come alive' for the viewer. This, in part, is why, landscapes taken at dawn and dusk, when the sun is low in the sky, are usually more pleasing than those taken at mid-day with the sun straight overhead.

But even though texture is an impor-

#### **Design: Texture**

tant part of a photograph, there are instances in which we may not want to emphasize it. This is especially true in portraits, where you want to minimize facial blemishes, wrinkles, etc., unless your intent is to show weathered facial characteristics.

So, be aware of texture in your images, the angle of your light source, and use both to get the image you want.

#### **Member Portraits**

Every month we will be introducing you to one or two of your fellow Camera Club Members. This month's portrait is Steve Reyer.

Steve joined our club in April. He has been a Professor of Electrical Engineering at MSOE for 19 years, and taught for 9 years before that at UW-Milwaukee. He has a Doctorate (Ph.D.) in Electrical Engineering.

Steve bought his first SLR camera, a Canon EOS D60 digital, in September, 2002, which piqued his interest in photography. Prior to that he used two small point-and-shoot cameras for a few years—a pocket 35mm camera and an old 1/3 megapixel digital (really!) - for vacations snapshots and the like.

With his old digital, he took many photos of down Milwaukee buildings, and started a website devoted to historic buildings. It has been featured in the Milwaukee Journal-Sentinel and Milwaukee Magazine. One of his early panoramas of Milwaukee's skyline was published in a New York music magazine. His new Canon SLR digital has afforded Steve the chance to capture images the way he wants. Several of his accomplishments have been noted in earlier editions of this newsletter. Some of his Cedarburg contest photos will be on exhibit at the Cedarburg Cultural Center until August.

Steve hasn't settled on any particular area of photographic interest; he is just enjoying whatever images intrigue him.

## Back to the Basics

Each month This space will cover some of the basics of photography. The topic this month is How to Photograph Fireworks.

With the 4th of July coming up, I thought I'd share an article I found on www.takegreatpictures.com with you. Here is an excerpt:

Photographs of fireworks are spectacular, colorful, and fairly easy to do once you know the tricks. For best results, you will need: an SLR camera, tripod, cable release, 1-2 rolls of film, a long lens, and plenty of patience. Since you don't know exactly when the fireworks will explode, and you are aiming to capture their trails, you will need to hold the camera shutter open for 2-30 seconds. Compact cameras don't offer this long exposure feature so you will need an SLR camera with a manual exposure mode called 'Bulb'.

### How to Photograph Fireworks

To get sharp images, you must keep the camera perfectly still. Propping your camera on a wall, car-top or table may suffice, but nothing beats a good, solid tripod. You'll also need a cable release to activate the shutter without touching and moving the camera.

Despite the low light, the best film is actually slow film as it holds stronger colors. Use 50 or 100-speed print film.

Waterfront settings are good as you can include the reflections of the fireworks in your shot. Cityscapes, landmarks, or people add context to the shot, but remember that they'll come out as silhouettes, so don't include faces or other details. High viewpoints, upwind from the smoke, are usually best. Get there early to secure your spot and select a lens (usually a telephoto) that will fill the frame with trails. Use the first burst to focus the

lens (don't rely on your 'infinity' setting).

To photograph the fireworks, open the shutter. That's it. Shoot off a whole roll of film to get a few good shots. Try different apertures (f8 is the safest) and different zoom settings. Include only a few bursts to fill up the frame; too many will look messy. To reduce the effect of street lighting, cover the lens between bursts with your hand, a black card, or a black cap.
