Pot Luck

In this column, I will be sharing miscellaneous information, interesting facts, and excerpts from photographic articles that I think may be of general interest.

WACCO has chosen the special slide categories for the next several competitions:

Fall 2003 General Slide—Domesticated Flowers. "A cultivated flower such as but not limited to roses, tulips, etc."

Fall 2003 Nature Slide—Fungi/Mushroom. "The non-flowering plants subdivision of the Thallophyta which are devoid of chlorophyll, reproduce chiefly by asexual means, and obtain nourishment either as a parasite on living organisms or as a saprophyte on dead organic matter. They include molds, mildews, rusts, mushrooms, and puffballs."

Spring 2004 General Slide—Weather. "A condition of the atmosphere with respect to heat or cold, wetness or dryness, calm or storm, clearness or cloudiness." (NOTE: This will also be the category for our Club slide show to be held in March.)

Spring 2004 Nature Slide—Wild Flower. "Wild Flowers are NOT cultivated. Cultivated flowers, such as roses and tulips are not eligible for competition in this category, nor are they eligible for the nature division."

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This month we will discuss how to mark your slide and print entries for competition.

SLIDES:

Mark a "thumbspot" (a dark circle - I like the little 1/4 inch dots I bought at the map store) on the lower left corner of the slide as you view it. (Normally the shiny side of the slide.) On this same side, put the title and the Class and Category codes (depending upon the competition).

On the other side put your name and address. (Tiny return address labels (Avery 5267—1/2 X 1-3/4) work reasonably well. You should

also include your club name for WACCO competitions.

PRINTS:

The new WACCO rules call for 3 size mats or boards: 8x10, 11x14, and 16x20.

Large prints (color or monochrome) must measure larger than 8x10 and be mounted on the 16x20 mat or board. Small prints can be any size from 3x5 up to 8x10 and must be mounted on either a 8x10 or 11x14 mat or board.

On the back clearly mark your name, address, and print title. Also place a large and dark arrow pointing the 'up' direction for the print. Please make sure that this arrow is

easily visible in the darkened room where these prints are judged.

OTHER COMPETITION RULES:

Some competitions have rules different than stated here. Read all information that is with the competition announcement to be sure that you follow directions.

Pot Luck

In this column, I will be sharing miscellaneous information, interesting facts, and excerpts from photographic articles that I think may be of general interest.

Any interested members can start shooting pictures at midnight on Friday and can continue shooting until midnight on Saturday. As a group, we will be meeting at 9am on Saturday at the Community Center (where our meetings are held) and will break up into smaller groups of 2 or 3 photographers. We will then decide where each different group will be shooting so that we can try to get a little of everything all over the Village. We will probably meet for lunch to review what we have. You may shoot slides, print, or digital. At our October meeting we will take a few minutes to see how many members are interested in participating in this event, and will then decide what to do with our results.

So mark this day on your calendars, and join us as a group at 9am, or go out by yourself anytime during the 24 hours of the day and see what you can find. Please call Jyoti or Carole if you have any questions or comments about this event.

Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

This month the exercise will be to take an entire 36-shot roll of the same subject. The objective is to force yourself to see something in that subject that you would normally miss.

To make this a successful exercise, you need to select an appropriate subject. It should be something that interests or intrigues you; it needs to be something complex enough to provide the variety you will need for 36 shots, but not so big that it is not recognizable as the same subject; and it needs to be accessible and stable enough to allow you to take 36 shots.

The "rules" of this exercise are:

- You must take all of the shots during the same session.
- After every shot, reset all camera settings and move your tripod.
- Approach the subject from an angle and/or direction and/or distance different than the last shot.
- You may use a combination of lenses, filters, apertures, shutter speeds, multiple exposures, and other techniques and accessories.

You will most likely find that the first several shots will come quickly. But about half way through the roll, you will be struggling to find a new perspective from which to shoot. Here is where you will have to push yourself to find something new in your subject, or at least a new way to present it.

Hopefully, when you look at your completed images, you will be pleasantly surprised at the variety of images you can get from a single subject. And perhaps along the way you will have discovered a new way of 'seeing' through your lense.

Pot Luck

In this column, I will be sharing miscellaneous information, interesting facts, and excerpts from photographic articles that I think may be of general interest.

Today I have an excerpt from an article by Timothy Dwight Morton, APSA, that was in the January 2003 PSA Journal.

How To Keep Enjoying Your Photography

Once in a while, as photographers, we seem to hit the wall! We don't feel that our photography is going anywhere, and we are looking for ways to refresh our enthusiasm. The list below makes some suggestions:

Make sure all your equipment is clean and functioning properly—make any necessary repairs.

Shoot in black and white or color, whichever you do not normally use.

Arrange your photographic files in order—a good thing for a rainy day (and throw out whatever you now think is no good!).

Take your camera everywhere (or at least have a single-use camera in your pocket).

Shoot images of your family—not just the "stand there and say CHEESE" type, but something imaginative and novel.

Do a self-portrait-same applies.

Shoot with a panoramic single-use camera and see the effect.

Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

This month the exercise is intended to expand your photographic experiences and can help get you out of a creative 'plateau'.

The basic idea is to put yourself in unfamiliar surroundings and to rely on your intuition and first impressions to shoot pictures. Do not concentrate on the mechanics, like composition, shutter speed, aperture, etc. Just shoot whatever feels right.

To begin, you need to find subjects to shoot that are different from what you normally do. If you normally do close-ups, try doing landscapes. If you normally do nature photogra-

phy, try shooting people or buildings. You get the idea. You need to find unfamiliar subjects to experiment with.

Then pick a time-frame, an hour was suggested in my source. This time limit is important because it will force you to respond to what you see and will not allow you time to do any time-intensive set-up. In the one hour time-frame, you should be able to shoot several rolls of film.

Now that you have chosen your subjects and have selected your time limit, go and shoot. Fill the frame with whatever looks interesting, click the shutter, and move on. Perhaps you may reframe the last shot, or maybe zoom in, or maybe change orientation, or maybe bracket the same shot, or maybe move on to something else interesting.

Let your creative instincts take over and let your mind relax.

When you get your completed images back, arrange them in chronological order and take a critical look to see how your photographic mind works. And perhaps you will have found a new subject that piques your interest enough to try again.

Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

This month the exercise will demonstrate how the changes in the daylight throughout the day will affect the appearance or 'mood' of the same subject.

Natural daylight will differ throughout the day, not only depending on the angle of the sun over time, but also by the absence or presence of clouds, haze, fog, and other atmospheric conditions. Photographs shot with daylight rarely look the same twice. Normally a landscape will look better shot early in the morning when the light is soft and warm rather than at midday with a bright sun. How-

ever, on some days, a particular scene may look its best at noon. There is no sure way to predict when the light will be just right for the subject.

So this month's exercise is to select a scene and shoot pictures throughout the day. Try to select a day where the weather will be variable throughout the day; some sun, some clouds, and even some rain or snow. This will provide you with more variety in your photos. Then select a pleasant scene that is easily accessible. Each shot should show the same subject for comparison, but you certainly can move the horizon to take advantage of an interesting sky. Your goal will be to get at least one shot each hour from before sunrise until

after sunset. Keep track of the time each photograph was taken.

When you get your images back, put them in chronological order and compare what impact the quality and direction of light had on the final photograph. Hopefully you will find something in this exercise to help make your land-scapes more interesting.

mounted on the 11x14 should be an 8x10 or reasonably close.



Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

This month's exercise is really more of a challenge. But with the winter months approaching, now is the ideal time to search for ice to photograph.


Ice can transform the mundane into the magical. Look for the hoar frost on trees and shrubs. Look for interesting patterns that form on shallow ponds as the water freezes into ice. Look for the different shapes icicles take as they form from the melting water off the end of eaves. The shoreline of Lake Michigan offers us a variety of locations to search for interesting ice formations. And don't forget the myriad of rivers and creeks that we have in our commu-

nities. All of these locations can provide us with opportunities for capturing images of ice.

However, trying to photograph ice can present some exposure challenges. When the ice is mainly white, like what you will find by our lake and rivers, the default incamera exposure meters want to underexpose the scene and may cause the ice to appear gray in the final image. In order to keep the ice white in your photograph, you will want to increase your exposure at least a half stop, or maybe even a full stop if the light is bright. You may also want to consider using bracketing in order to raise your chances of getting the image you have in mind. You will not have this exposure issue with clear ice, like that in icicles or shallow ponds.

Shooting these is closer to shooting glass. You may or may not have reflected images, depending on the clarity of the ice, the intensity of the light, and the angle of your lense.

When you go out shooting ice, remember that the cold can affect your camera just like it affects you. Try to keep both your camera and batteries warm. You may want to wear them next to your body, inside your jacket, when you are not shooting in order to protect them from the cold.

Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

Last month, I talked about photographing ice in winter. To follow up with this theme, this month I will share with you some tips to keep warm and safe while shooting outside in the winter. The 4 keys to keeping warm in cold weather are:

- Keep moisture away from your skin. Your first layer of clothing next to your skin should 'wick' perspiration away to keep you dry. Silk or Polypropylene long underwear are your best choices.
- Trap your body heat in layers of clothes. Your next layer should trap your body heat and not let it escape. Here you need breathable fabrics that will keep you warm even they get wet. Polar fleece or wool are your best choices. Cotton

- or denim are your worst choices; they will not retain your body warmth and will provide zero protection when wet.
- S. Keep wind away from your body. You outer layer should be a wind and water resistant jacket. Make sure that the jacket has cuffs to keep out the wind. The longer the jacket, the more it will protect you. In extremely cold weather you will also want wind and water resistant pants. I've found that a good pair of wool hunting pants and silk long underwear will keep me comfortable outside all day.
- 4. Cover your extremities. Feet: same first and second layers as your body, and then waterproof and insulated boots are a must. I buy my winter boots a half size too big so that I can wear heavy wool socks. Head: cover with a heavy wool hat or cap and make sure that

your ears are covered. Hands: mittens are warmer than gloves, but you can't operate a camera with mittens. I often wear a pair of light weight gloves covered by a pair of sheepskin mittens. My hands stay warm and I can take off the mittens when I need to and still have something covering my fingers. Another choice is hunting gloves with no fingertips that have a 'half-mitten' that covers the fingers.

I hope that this will help some of you try winter photography.



Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

This month the exercise will help us to enhance our ability to 'fill the frame'.

One of the more common mistakes beginning photographers make is to try to include too many things in one image. Before taking a photograph, you need to decide what subject you are attempting to capture and then work on eliminating any and all elements that detract from that subject. This month's exercise will give you some practice in isolating your subject or perhaps finding a new subject within your original subject.

Take a few rolls of film and go out

to your favorite spot to photograph. For this exercise, you need to shoot between 4 and 6 photographs of the same subject. Set up the initial shot just like you normally would do, and take the picture. Then try to get closer and closer with each of the next shots. You can do this by moving closer or by using a longer lense.

Try to figure out what is the most interesting part of the last frame you took, and then try to make that your point of interest. Sometimes we are so used to seeing familiar things that we don't really take time to look at them. This exercise will encourage us to really look at the details within our frame and often we can find things that we did not see before.

If you start out with a small subject, like a single flower, your final image may end up being only part of a flower or a colorful abstract. If you start out with a landscape, seascape, or other 'scape', you may end up with a single plant, an interesting wave, or something else totally unexpected.

Hopefully you will enjoy this exercise and will find some new ways of looking at old subjects.

Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

This month the exercise will be to experiment with shooting during or shortly after it rains.

Most of us are comfortable outside shooting when it is sunny and warm, but bad weather presents interesting opportunities that we cannot get when the weather is nice. And with the coming spring season, we always get plenty of rainy days to play with.

Heavy rain is difficult to deal with because it can be hard to keep the rain off your camera equipment. But during lighter rains, or when you can find a shelter out of the rain, you can fairly easily keep the raindrops away from your lens.

Prepare for this rainy-day shoot by scouting out scenic or interesting locations. Look for potential shelters: park shelters, building overhangs, etc. Then when the rain starts, grab your equipment and head for your chosen spot. Or you can plan on going out after the rain is over.

When shooting in the rain, look for the effect the rain has on people, plants, or other subjects. A misty rain will provide a moody feeling in landscapes. Look for reflections on the wet pavement or in puddles that form.

When shooting after the rain, look for droplets on plants, windows, or

anything that was out during the rain. Look for kids playing in the puddles. The rain will wash the dust from the air and make everything seem clearer. Try to capture the 'just-washed' feeling in the air.

And when you return from your rainy-day shoot, be sure to wipe down all of your equipment before you pack it away.

I hope this give you some ideas for trying something new.



Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

This month the exercise will be to experiment with shooting abstract photographs.

An abstract image is not an image of an entire object, but is instead your interpretation of a portion of that object. You need to emphasize form, color, and composition. The actual subject is no longer relevant. You will have to look at what you are seeing in a whole new way.

There are several ways to achieve this abstraction, but my 3 favorites are:

1) Isolate only one aspect of the

whole subject.

- Enlarge a small area of the subject, thereby making the subject almost unrecognizable.
- Emphasize the design, texture, color, or contrast of the subject and ignore the context.

A truly 'abstract' image will cause the viewer to ask "What is this?" It will require the viewer to look beyond the recognizable and become actively involved in interpreting the image. Some viewers enjoy the challenge and beauty in an abstract image; and others will not like what they do not recognize.

Your challenge this month is to take a roll of film and go out and shoot a full roll of different abstract images. When a subject catches

your interest, look at it closer and try to identify all of the separate components. Remember, you are looking for interesting form, color, design or texture, not content. Feel free to experiment with double exposures, out of focus shots, long exposures while zooming your lense, filters, or any other techniques that will produce an interesting abstract image.

Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

This month the exercise will be to shoot from different points of view than what you are used to. When we are usually out shooting, we tend to set up our tripods and put our camera at eye-level and then shoot our subject. We sometimes will tilt the camera lens down to catch a flower or plant, and sometimes will tilt the lens up to catch a building or something in the sky. But in most cases our final image will be what we normally will see when we are out. But how often do we get down on our knees or lay on the ground to shoot something above us? Or how often do

we climb up on a ladder or up a hill to shoot something below us? Well this month's exercise is to do exactly that.

The next time you are out taking pictures try to find different points of views to shoot from. Look at your subject from all points of view - all sides, from the top, and from the bottom. This will give you a different perspective, not only of your subject, but also how the light and shadows play differently from different vantage points. You may find something interesting that you did not see initially.

Try laying on the ground under a tree or next to a building and shooting straight up. Try climbing a tree or standing up on a rock or sturdy fence and shoot downwards

towards your subject. Try sitting on the ground to shoot cars, trucks, trains, etc.

All of these types of techniques should provide interesting and unusual ways of interpreting what we see. And isn't that what we, as photographers, are supposed to do? Show our audience our unique interpretations of our everyday world.

Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to suggest different photographic exercises that we can use to improve our photographic skills.

With the 4th of July coming up, 1 thought i'd share an article I found on www.takegreatpictures.com with you Here is an excerpt:

Photographs of fireworks are spectacular, colorful, and fairly easy to do once you know the tricks. For best results, you will need: an SLR camera, tripod, cable release, 1-2 rolls of film, a long lens, and plenty of patience. Since you don't know exactly when the fireworks will explode, and you are aiming to capture their trails, you will need to hold the camera shutter open for 2-30 seconds. Compact cameras don't offer this long exposure feature so you will need an SLR camera with a manual exposure mode called 'Bulb'

To get sharp images, you must keep

the camera perfectly still. Propping your camera on a wall, car-top or table may suffice, but nothing beats a good, solid tnpod. You'll also need a cable release to activate the shutter without touching and moving the camera.

Despite the low light, the best film is actually slow film as it holds stronger colors. Use 50 or 100-speed print film.

Waterfront settings are good as you can include the reflections of the fire-works in your shot. Cityscapes, land-marks, or people add context to the shot, but remember that they'll come out as silhouettes, so don't include faces or other details. High view-points, upwind from the smoke, are usually best. Get there early to secure your spot and select a lens (usually a telephoto) that will fill the frame with trails. Use the first burst to facus the lens (don't rely on your 'infinity' set-

ting).

To photograph the fireworks, open the shutter. That's it. Shoot off a whole roll of film to get a few good shots. Try different apertures (f8 is the safest) and different zoom settings. Include only a few bursts to fill up the frame; too many will look messy. To reduce the effect of street lighting, cover the lens between bursts with your hand, a black card, or a black cap.
