Odds & Ends

In this column, I will be sharing miscellaneous information, interesting facts, and excerpts from photographic articles that I think may be of general interest.

WACCO has chosen the special slide categories for the next several competitions:

Fall 2004 General Slide—Tabletop. "An image of static arrangements of objects"

Fall 2004 Nature Slide—Birds. "Birds are warm-blooded, feathered, egg-laying vertebrate animals having fore limbs modified as wings. Chickens or other domesticated fowl are not eligible for competition in this category."

Spring 2005 General Slide—Scapes. "A photo representing a view of scenery: land, sea, or air."

Spring 2004 Nature Slide—Wild Animals. "Animals are living organisms other than plants. Wild animals inhabit the forests, deserts, etc. and are not domesticated, tamed, or bred for specific characteristics. Domesticated animals are not eligible for competition in this category. Insects, spiders, and birds are not eligible in this category of competition because of their special designation in other competitions."

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This month we will discuss how to mark your slide and print entries for competition.

SLIDES:

Mark a "thumbspot" (a dark circle - I like the little 1/4 inch dots I bought at the map store) on the lower left corner of the slide as you view it. (Normally the shiny side of the slide.) On this same side, put the title and the Class and Category codes (depending upon the competition).

On the other side put your name and address. (Tiny return address labels (Avery 5267—1/2 X 1-3/4) work reasonably well. You should

also include your club name for WACCO competitions.

PRINTS:

The new WACCO rules call for 3 size mats or boards: 8x10, 11x14, and 16x20.

Large prints (color or monochrome) must measure larger than 8x10 and be mounted on the 16x20 mat or board. Small prints can be any size from 3x5 up to 8x10 and must be mounted on either a 8x10 or 11x14 mat or board.

On the back clearly mark your name, address, and print title. Also place a large and dark arrow pointing the 'up' direction for the print. Please make sure that this arrow is

easily visible in the darkened room where these prints are judged.

OTHER COMPETITION RULES:

Some competitions have rules different than stated here. Read all information that is with the competition announcement to be sure that you follow directions.

In this column, I will be sharing miscellaneous information, interesting facts, and excerpts from photographic articles that I think may be of general interest.

Our Menomonee Falls Camera Club has just joined the **Wisconsin Print Circuit**. There used to be 7 or 8 clubs participating and they had been holding 2 competitions each year. There are now 10 clubs participating, so there will be only a single competition per year.

There are two categories of prints: Color and Monochrome. The prints must be mounted on 8×10 or 16×20 board no thicker than 1/8 inch. This means no foam board. This will make it easier to transport all of the prints to the 10 clubs for scoring. Any one photographer may enter 1 print in each of the 2 categories. These need to be turned in at our October meeting. They will then be sent around to all 10 clubs, ours included, for members to score. Please remember that these prints will get lots of handling, both between clubs and during the scoring. We should get the prints back by June or July. There will be a First, Second, Third, and perhaps one or two Honorable Mentions.

If you are interested in participating, please bring your prints to our October meeting. You may bring one color print and/or one monochrome print.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I decided to review some of the interesting places here in Wisconsin to visit with your camera.

My choice for this month is a Road Trip around Lake Winnebago. The lake has about 88 miles of shoreline. The recommended tour is to start at Lakeside Park in Fond du Lac and follow Hwy 151 north on the east side of the lake. Along this way, the best places to stop are at Columbia Park (about 10 miles out of Fond du Lac on County W). Soon 151 will veer east and you need to stay on Hwy 55. The next place to stop is Calumet County Park (20 miles further on County EE) and at High Cliff State Park (about 4 miles further).

When you leave High Cliff State Park, catch Hwy 114 and 55 north, stay on Hwy 114 through Menasha to Nee-

nah. Now you are on the west side of the lake. You can catch Hwy 41 out of Neenah. Hwys 41 and 45 take turns being closest to the lake, and both will bring you back to Fond du Lac.

There are 4 lighthouses on Lake Winnebago. They are some of the newest in Wisconsin.

Neenah Lighthouse: Active lighthouse located on Lakeshore Ave. at the end of Wisconsin Ave in Neenah.

Asylum Bay Lighthouse: No longer operational. Located several miles north of Oshkosh on the lake's western coast. From the north, take Hwy 41 south until you reach Snell Road. Turn left and go .3 miles past County A to Sherman Road. Right on Sherman about .8 mile past Asylum Bay boat Launch. Follow winding road to Asylum Point and a small parking lot.

Rockwell Lighthouse: Privately owned and operated in a residential area in Oshkosh. The Address is 6 Lake Street.

Fond du Lac Lighthouse: Also known as Lakeside Park Lighthouse because that is where it is located.

If any club member has a favorite place in Wisconsin, please let me know and I will include it in this column to share with the our other members.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I decided to review some of the interesting places here in Wisconsin to visit with your camera.

My choice for this month is Architecture in the Milwaukee area. Buildings are a common subject for photography and architecture is the subject for our all-member slide show this July.

The Milwaukee area is rich in architectural treasures. The most popular now is the Milwaukee Art Museum's Calatrava addition with its Brise Soleil because it is the newest and most striking. But there are many fine examples of various architectural styles that were popular throughout the last century or so in are area. Here are a few:

Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church, the last major project of Frank Lloyd Wright, was built in a Byzantine inspired style. It is a circular building with a blue-tiled dome roof that, upon

occasion, has blended in with the color of the sky. (91st & Congress)

St Josaphat Basicila Catholic Church was completed in 1901, and built by the Polish parishioners from materials purchased from the salvage of the Federal Building in Chicago. It is probably one of the most photographed churches in Milwaukee, both inside and out. Tours are available Sundays after the 10am mass or during the week by appointment (6th & Lincoln)

St Joan of Arc Chapel is a 15th Century French chapel that was brought to Milwaukee brick by brick and reconstructed in 1965. The is the only example of 15th Century architecture that you'll find in Milwaukee, and worth the trip if you haven't seen it before. (14th & W Wisconsin, you will have to walk in from the street)

The Pabst Mansion was designed by architect George B Ferry, one of Milwaukee's favorite architects of the late

1800's, in the German Renaissance Revival style. Other wealthy German-Americans then copied the Pabsts and built other German-style homes that gave Milwaukee its 'old-world' charm. It is now open for public tours. (2000 W Wisconsin Avenue)

The Alexander Mitchell Mansion was originally built in 1859 for Mr. Mitchell, arguably one of Milwaukee's richest men. It was extensively remodeled in the 1870's by Edward Townsend Mix. The remodeling emphasized the French Second Empire style, an extremely ornate style that has a different look for different levels. This building is now the Wisconsin Club (900 W Wisconsin Ave) (Side note: Billy Mitchell, outspoken advocate for air power in the 1920's, was Alexander's grandson.)

And I haven't touched on any commercial buildings yet. I'll save that for another month.

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I decided to review some of the interesting places here in Wisconsin to visit with your camera.

My choice for this month is "Holiday Lights".

Now that the holiday season is here, we have lots of opportunities for capturing the spirit of the season in our photographs. There are many extraordinary displays of lights for us to experience and photograph. Here are a few of my favorites:

"Holiday Night Lights at the Milwaukee County Zoo". December 3-4, 10-11, 17-18, 2004. 6 to 9pm

"Candy Cane Lane" is a long standing traditional neighborhood event at 92nd & Oklahoma. Drive through the neighborhood and see the extravaganza of lighting. Donations to a se-

lected charity is appreciated. May be difficult to photograph because of the traffic.

Milwaukee "Holiday Lights Festival" at Pere Marquette Park downtown. November 18th through January 2nd.

Chicago's Navy Pier "Winter Wonderfest features hundreds of decorated trees and spectacular holiday decorations. December 10th through January 2nd. (I've not been, but it looks interesting.)

And finally, my personal favorite: the WPS Garden of Lights at the Green Bay Botanical Garden (2600 Larsen Road). Along a 1-mile walking path you will find over 150,000 lights in very innovative and imaginative designs, including flowers, snowflakes, insects, animals, and other botanical creations. Horse drawn wagon rides are also available. \$5 admission; \$7 wagon rides. I've had no problems bringing in my tripod. See

It can be tricky to get your exposure correct for these types of lighting displays at night. One of my reference books suggests starting at the following settings and then experiment:

100 speed: try 1 s @ f4 200 speed: try 1s @ f5.6 400 speed: try 1/15 s @ f2 800 speed: try 1/30s @ f2

I usually just set up on aperture preferred and shoot at the default shutter speed from a tripod. About half of my shots turn out ok. Good luck and enjoy the seasonal opportunities.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I decided to review some of the interesting places here in Wisconsin to visit with your camera

The topic this month is a continuation of Milwaukee area architecture. The original column in November covered examples of churches and residences. Now I will conclude with a few examples of commercial buildings.

Milwaukee was a growing community in the late 1800's. Between 1880 and 1900, the population swelled from 71,000 to over 285,000. This growth brought a building boom of both residences and commercial structures. Here are just a few examples of commercial buildings built mostly in this period.

The Milwaukee City Hall was designed by H.C. Koch and built between 1893 and 1895. This is a fine example of German Renaissance design with Romanesque overtones evident in the extensive use of arches on the upper story and on the 350 foot bell tower. This particular style is patterned after the common German town

Hall design. (Water & Wells)

On Michigan Avenue there stands probably the most ornamental buildings on any block in the area, and indeed, perhaps in the whole United States. The 2 buildings are Mitchell Building and the Mitchell Commerce Building, also referred to as the "Grain Exchange". They were built for Alexander Mitchell and designed by Edward Townsend Mix in the Second French Empire style. (Just like Mitchell's mansion that he had Mix remodel.) If you go see them, notice the extensive and intricate design and the different types of design used on each floor. (200 Block of E Michigan)

The Milwaukee Public Library building was designed in 1895 by George Bowman Ferry, one of Milwaukee's most popular architects at the time. This building is built in the Italian Renaissance Revival style with its delicate and elaborate carvings. (8th and W Wisconsin)

There are also a few examples of newer buildings that are of special note.

The old Wisconsin Gas Company building

was built in 1930. It is an interesting combination of the standard Art Deco style with an Aztek flavor in the zig-zag designs running horizontally along the building. (626 E Wisconsin)

The old Marine Bank Building, now the Bank One Building (soon to be something else), built in the 1960's is a fine example of the "Glass Box" style popular at the time. This architectural style is composed of a symmetrical, rectangular box with glass walls. (Water & Wisconsin)

The Reuss Plaza, built during the last decade of the 1900's, is a 'fractured' Glass Box. It is not symmetrical nor rectangular, but it does have glass walls. (4th & W Wisconsin)

There are many other fine examples are the various architectural styles in the Milwaukee area. If this topic is of interest to you, you can find many informative books available on the architecture of the area.

Have fun discovering all of the diversity in our buildings.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I decided to review some of the interesting places here in Wisconsin to visit with your camera. I had thought about listing some interesting spots to photograph winter scenery, but I'm not much of a winter-weather photographer. So I thought I'd start looking forward to the warm weather and list a few of our Wisconsin Historic Sites that make for interesting photographs.

My favorite in the area is Old World Wisconsin, about 45 minutes west on 194 and then south on Hwy 67. (262-594-6300) This site contains historical ethnic minicommunities with working farmsteads and actors portraying immigrants that lived at the time.

You can walk around to the different communities or take the trolley between communities.

Another similar site that I visit several times a year is Heritage Hill State Park up in Green Bay. (800-721-5150). In addition to the ethnic mini-communities with a working farm, they also have a 1700's area depicting early life as a trader, and Fort Howard, a military facility and hospital from the mid 1800's. This park is considerably smaller than Old World Wisconsin, but has some very charming buildings. My only concern here is that they do not allow tripods unless you purchase a \$500 (last time I asked) photographer's permit.

Wade House, just off Hwy 23 be-

tween Sheboygan and Fond du Lac is a restored stagecoach in. This is in the Kettle Moraine North area which also contains several scenic State Parks.

Stonefield is a recreated 1900's farming village near Nelson Dewey State Park, on the bluffs of the Mississippi River.

This year's 12th Annual Walk will be held on May 21-22, 2005.

Door County has 10 lighthouses. The availability of these lighthouses vary year-to-year. And this year's information will not be available until after this newsletter is published, but normally 6 or 7 of these lighthouses are available for tours, 2 are available for viewing only from the water, and one, the Chambers Island Light, is

available only when Chambers Island is open to the public.

You can drive to most of the lighthouses yourself if you'd like, or you can take a variety of tours. The Door County Trolley has a 4hour tour that will take you to 5 of the lighthouses. There are also 4 or 5 boat cruises that will take you to or past some of the lighthouses not available by land. Several of these cruises last year ran on Friday, so you can get a head start by viewing some of the lighthouses from the water on Friday. You can also take 2 ferries, one from the mainland to Washington Island and the second over to Rock Island, to tour the Pottawatomie Lighthouse, newly renovated and the northern-most lighthouse in Door County. This trip

will probably take you the better part of a day.



Back to the Basics

My favorite is the 1.4 mile self-guided trail that goes through some prairie land, wanders around a pond, and then goes through a small forested area. They have a wide variety of plant life there for photographing. The visitor center is closed on weekends when they do not have any planned activities. Kettle Moraine State Forest -South Unit is located near Eagle Wisconsin. The main visitor center is right off of Hwy 59, just a smidge west of Eagle. This area has 4 separate campgrounds, a beautiful visitor center, several lakes and streams, plus 7 self-guided nature trails. My favorite trail is the 1.5 mile Scuppernong Springs trail, which winds around the pond and passes several old structures, or what is left of them. Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I decided to review some of the interesting places here in Wisconsin to visit with your camera. This month I will tell you about one of my favorite places in Wisconsin: Washington Island.

This roughly 6 x 6.5 mile island is located off the tip of Door County. To get there you need to catch the Washington Island Car Ferry from Northpoint Pier. From the middle of May through mid August, it runs every 30 minutes, less frequently in spring and late summer. They claim to have a permanent population of between 650 and 680, with more residents during the tourist season. There are many fine motels, cottages, and bed & breakfasts if you want to spend the night.

During the peak season, there is a 90-minute Cherry Train tour which

leaves from the dock area and is well worth your time if you've not been here before. Or even if you have.

Some of the highlights of the island are:

Stavkirke, a Norwegian stave church constructed by island craftsman. Inside tours available in spring and fall only.

The Farm Museum, a collection of original buildings and implements used by early settlers.

Jacobsen Museum, located on the only inland lake, was the original home of Jens Jacobsen. Contains lots of fascinating relics from the early settler days.

Mountain Park and Lookout Tower. Nice little park where you can have your picnic (if you were prepared and brought something) and a tower to climb and get a great view of the island and surrounding water.

Sand Dunes Beach. This is sort of picturesque but every time I've been there, I've been plagued by small biting insects. Not my favorite place.

And a must for all first time visitors: The Albatross Drive-In. Best burgers on the island. Eat on one of their picnic tables or get it to go and drive over to Mountain Park for your lunch.

I've spent many days on Washington Island and am always finding something new and interesting. I hope you get a chance to see it for yourself. Chamber of Commerce - 1-920-847-2179

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I decided to review some of the interesting places here in Wisconsin to visit with your camera. This month I will share with you information about my absolute favorite place in Wisconsin: Rock Island.

This 912 acre island is located off the tip of Door County past Washington Island. The entire island is a Wisconsin State Park with 42 primitive campsites. The serenity of the park is enhanced by its remote location and the prohibition of all wheeled vehicles (with the exception of the park ranger's vehicles.)

To reach Rock Island, you first need to drive to Northport at the tip of the Door County mainland and take the Washington Island car ferry to Washington Island. There you drive to the other side of the island, about a 15 minute trip, and then take the passenger ferry, the Karfi, over to Rock Island. The Karfi has limited trips each day, so if

you plan on going, call ahead to get the schedule.

The history of Rock Island is fascinating to me. The island was already a significant Native American settlement when the Europeans started arriving in the middle of the 17th century. Then Rock Island became the first European settlement in Door County due to the great fishing available in the waters surrounding the island. As fishing boats became motorized, the families living on Rock Island moved to Washington Island, and most of Rock Island was purchased by a wealthy Illinois electrical inventor, Chester Thordarson, in 1910. He built several structures in the 20's, some of which are still standing today and are on both the State & National Register of Historical

Some of the other interesting things to see on Rock Island are:

The Potawatomi Lighthouse, built in 1836, the oldest lighthouse in Wisconsin, and newly restored.

8 hiking and nature trails taking between 30 minutes and 3 hours.

3 old cemeteries, containing remains of Chester Thordarson, several lighthouse keepers, early residents, and ship disaster victims.

1/2 mile of beautiful sand shoreline and sand gunes.

Mr. Thordarson's Boat House and Water Tower.

August Board Meeting



Odds & Ends

With the 4th of July coming up, I thought I'd share an article I found on www.takegreatpictures.com with you. Here is an excerpt:

Photographs of fireworks are spectacular, colorful, and fairly easy to do once you know the tricks. For best results, you will need: an SLR camera, tripod, cable release, 1-2 rolls of film, a long lens, and plenty of patience. Since you don't know exactly when the fireworks will explode, and you are aiming to capture their trails, you will need to hold the camera shutter open for 2-30 seconds. To get sharp images, you must keep the camera perfectly still. Propping your camera on a wall, car-top or table may suffice, but nothing beats a good, solid tripod. You'll also need a cable release to activate the shutter without touching and moving the camera.

Despite the low light, the best film is actually stow film as it holds stronger colors. Use 50 or 100-speed print film.

Waterfront settings are good as you can include the reflections of the fireworks in your shot. Cityscapes, landmarks, or people add context to the shot, but remember that they'll come out as silhouettes, so don't include faces or other details. Get there early to secure your spot and select a lens (usually a telephoto) that will fill the frame with trails. Use the first burst to focus the lens (don't rely on your 'infinity' setting).

To photograph the fireworks, open the shutter. That's it. Shoot off a whole roll of film to get a few good shots. Try different apertures (f8 is the safest) and different zoom settings. Include only a few bursts to fill up the frame; too many will look messy. To reduce the effect of street lighting, cover the lens between bursts with your hand, a black card, or a black cap.

Back to the Basics

Each morith we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I decided to review some of the interesting places here in Wisconsin to visit with your camera. Since this is the last newsletter for this year, I thought I'd share with you some interesting facts about our great state that I found in an October, 2003, issue of our Milwaukee Journal Sentine!

We're big!. Wisconsin is 294 miles across at its widest point and 145 at its narrowest. It is 318 miles from north to south.

We're diverse. There are 2,200 identified plants in the state, around 250 species of breeding birds, 19 species of snakes, 11 of turtles, 4 of lizards, and 65 species of mammals. Not to mention 5 million of us.

And we're wet. We have 800 miles of Great Lakes shoreline, 250 miles of Mississippi frontage, 44,000 miles of rivers and streams, over 85 waterfalls

and 48 lighthouses.

We have many miles of scenic and rustic roads. The Great River Road parallels the Mississippi. If haven't taken it in years, but I still remember some of the fantastic scenery we found along that road. If you have never taken a marked 'Rustic Road', try it sometime; you're in for a real treat.

We have many excellent and scenic State Parks. Some of my favorites (in addition to my absolute favorite, Rock Island) are:

Devil's Lake, near Baraboo, has some spectacular bluffs towering over a 360 acre lake. The color is amazing the 2nd or 3rd weekend of October

High Cliff State Park, overlooking Lake Winnebago, sits high above on limestone cliffs and contains some effigy mounds.

Peninsula State Park, on the bay in Door County, hosts an 1860's light-house and miles of diverse trails.

Potawatomi State Park, also in Door County, boasts of an observation tower from which you can see 16 miles across the bay on a clear day. This park also has many beautiful trails.

Copper Falls State Park, which I just visited this past weekend for the first time, is absolutely beautiful, contains 2 water falls and several rapids coursing through 8.5 miles of river, much of it flowing through a deep gorge.
