Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This month we will discuss how to mark your slide and print entries for competition.

SLIDES:

All slides must be 2"x2" only. Mark a "thumbspot" (a dark circle - I like the little 1/4 inch dots I bought at the map store) on the lower left corner of the slide as you view it. (Normally the shiny side of the slide.) On this same side, put the title and the Class and Category codes (depending upon the competition).

On the other side put your name and address. (Tiny return address labels (Avery 5267—1/2 X 1-3/4) work reasonably well. You should also include your club name for WACCO competitions.

PRINTS:

The new WACCO rules call for 3 size mats or boards: 8x10, 11x14, and 16x20. No framed prints will be accepted.

Large prints (color or monochrome) must measure larger than 8x12 and be mounted on the 16x20 mat or board

Small prints can be any size from 3.5x5 up to 8x10 and must be mounted on either a 8x10 or 11x14 mat or board.

On the back clearly mark your name, address, and print title. Also place a large and dark arrow pointing the 'up' direction for the print. Please make sure that this arrow is easily visible in the darkened room where these prints are judged.

DIGITAL:

WACCO is working on opening up a new Digital category. When this becomes available, you will need to check with Jeff Klug on the specifics.

OTHER COMPETITION RULES:

Some competitions have rules different than stated here. Read all information that is with the competition announcement to be sure that you follow directions.

Odds & Ends

WACCO has now included a Digital Image division in the bi-annual competitions. This division has the same 'special' categories as the current slide divisions. The instructions for digital images is included on the entry forms you can pick up at any meeting. But I have reprinted them here for your reference.

The Digital Image should be a maximum of 1024 (Width) x 768 (Height) or 7.5" (Height) x 10" (Width) @ 100dpi. It should be JPEG format with a maximum file size of 1.4mb. They must be on a CD which should have your Name, Phone number, and E-mail address on it. The images should be put into folders labeled for the category entered (General or Nature). Each image should be labeled with Category, Entry #, Title. Where the category would be "G" for General and "N" for Nature, the entry # from the report card, and the title of the image with an underscore between each item as shown:

Example: G_1_Milwaukee Art Museum.jpeg

The image is not eligible if it had previously received an Honorable Mention or any award from any division.

The Digital entry CD is to be mailed to the WACCO P.O. Box with completed entry form, fees, and self-addressed envelope or address label for the return of your CD by the host club.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I'm going to cover a variety of topics that will deal with creative photography and special effects. The topic this month is multiple exposures.

There are many different techniques that you can use to make multiple exposures. You can actually take multiple images on the same piece of film, or you can take separate images and then place them together on the same final image. This last technique is easiest to do with slides.

Regardless of the technique, one of the most critical factors is getting the exposure on each image correct. If you are going to be photographing multiple subjects against a dark background, and the subjects will not overlap on the final image, then you can shoot at the normal exposure. If however, your subjects will overlap, or the backgrounds are not dark, then you will have to adjust your exposure so that the sum of all of the multiple exposures should equal the total amount of light for a single exposure. You can do this by adjusting the f-stop or aperture as follows:

For 2 exposures, stop down 1 stop For 3 exposures, stop down 1-2/3 stops

For 4 exposures, stop down 2 stops.

Or you can adjust your ISO setting to be the default ISO setting of your film times the number of images. For example, if you are planning 5 images shooting 100 ISO, set your ISO to 500 and then shoot at your camera's exposure. But with this, you need to remember to reset your ISO setting when you go back to shooting single exposures.

Now on to the creative side of multiple exposures. You can let your creativity run wild with this. To get you started, here are a few examples I've seen:

2 images of the same flower, one sharp in focus and one blurred. This results in a sort of 'halo' effect.

Closeup detail for the 'background', like maybe a weathered barn board, and then an image of the actual barn.

A "Ghost" image taken at 1/4 exposure against a cemetery gate at 3/4 exposure.

Take these as a starting point, and let your creativity guide you towards those creative images.

Odds & Ends

WACCO has now included a Digital Image division in the bi-annual competitions. This division has the same 'special' categories as the current slide divisions. The instructions for digital images is included on the entry forms you can pick up at any meeting. But I have reprinted them here for your reference.

The Digital Image should be a maximum of 1024 (Width) x 768 (Height) or 7.5" (Height) x 10" (Width) @ 100dpi. It should be JPEG format with a maximum file size of 1.4mb. They must be on a CD which should have your Name, Phone number, and E-mail address on it. The images should be put into folders labeled for the category entered (General or Nature). Each image should be labeled with Category, Entry #, Title. Where the category would be "G" for General and "N" for Nature, the entry # from the report card, and the title of the image with an underscore between each item as shown:

Example: G_1_Milwaukee Art Museum.jpeg

The image is not eligible if it had previously received an Honorable Mention or any award from any division.

The Digital entry CD is to be mailed to the WACCO P.O. Box with completed entry form, fees, and self-addressed envelope or address label for the return of your CD by the host club.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I'm going to cover a variety of topics that will deal with creative photography and special effects. The topic this month is Creative Blur.

Shutter speed has a far more creative use in photography than in simply being one of the factors in determining correct exposure. With some imagination and a lot of practice, it can capture movement and action in your image that cannot be seen by the naked eye. Longer than normal exposures can result in some blurring that will give your final image a sense of speed, power, moodiness, or unreality. It can give your images a dimension of time.

Examples of this type of creative blur can often be found in sports photographs and in moving water or waterfall photographs.

In sports photography, you can use a longer than normal exposure and then

pan your camera to follow the action. In the resulting image, your subject will be relatively sharp and the background and other static surrounding objects will be blurred. This makes your subject stand out and emphasizes the speed of the action.

When taking pictures of waterfalls, moving water, or waves breaking over rocks, a longer exposure will produce a milky-like look to the water. You will have to experiment with exposure times, but usually shutter speeds of 1/10 to 1/3 of a second produce the soft flow of water, but still leave in some of the details. Exposure times of a second or more can result in a very soft, ethereal image, but often the detail in the water is 'washed out' during these long exposures. You'll have to experiment with different speeds to see what effects you prefer.

Another technique you can use to give a sense of motion to a static subject is to take a long exposure using a zoom lense, and then change the focal length (zoom in or zoom out) during the exposure. This works best with a simple subject centered in the image.

For all of these techniques, you will need to use a tripod to steady your camera during the long exposures. A remote shutter release is also helpful and will eliminate the slight movement of the camera when you depress the shutter button. And in some sunnier locations, you may need to use a polarizer or neutral density filter to allow you to get the longer shutter speeds you will need.

These techniques will add a new dimension to your photographic skills. It will take a lot of patience and practice to get the image you have in mind, but this technique can produce images of surprising beauty and considerable impact.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I'm going to cover a variety of topics that will deal with creative photography and special effects. The topic this month is abstract images.

All of my resources have different, and some long-winded, definitions of what is meant by abstract photography. But the common interpretation is that abstract photography uses patterns, lines, colors, shapes, or textures to capture an image that is different than the actual subject. Color and form are primary; content is not important. Attention is focused on the visual elements of a subject, not on the subject itself.

There are several techniques that can be used to create abstract images:

Isolation: showing only one small part of the original

- "whole". A long-focus lens is useful for this.
- Enlargement: to reveal new details not seen when viewing the "whole". A macro lens can be used for this.
- Technical Manipulation: throwing the image way out of focus, using long exposures for moving subjects, zooming during exposure.
- Unusual lighting or camera angle: showing the subject in a perspective not normally seen.
- Removing identifiable elements: to concentrate on the visual elements and force the viewer to think about what they are seeing.

In abstract photography, composition is critical. Since there is no 'subject' as such, you need to emphasize one particular aspect of the visual elements—pattern, lines, color, shape, or texture—in order to pull everything together to produce a pleasing image.

Abstracts do not necessarily do well in competitions. People (and judges) are often uncomfortable viewing something that does not easily fit within their 'frame of reference'.

However, working on taking abstract photographs can strengthen our powers of observation and release some of our untapped creativity. It can be very satisfying to create an image that is our very own, personal, interpretation of the world we all share.

Please be aware that I do not read my email on any regular basis, so please do not email me if you need any sort of response. I always log in on the 15th or 16th of each month, right before I start this newsletter. And then I check again on the 19th or 20th, right before I print out the final copy for publication.

Last summer, we all had **photographic 'assignments'** that we then discussed in our September meeting. Our 5 assignments were to take images of patterns of nature, panning, sports, modes of transportation, and open. Think about if you would like a similar 'assignment' for this coming summer. We will be discussing this at a meeting in the near future.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I'm going to cover a variety of topics that will deal with creative photography and special effects. The topic this month is moving lights.

The word 'photography' means drawing with light. One of the key elements of a successful photograph is the lighting.

During the day, the light provided by the sun, and all of its many reflections and diffusions, provide our lighting. However, after the sun has set, we need to rely mostly on artificial light sources for our photography. Most evening photography relies on static light sources, such as building lights, street lights, flash, and reflections of these sources. However, you can capture some interesting, and sometimes, dramatic images by using moving lights.

The most common example of this technique we see is moving cars and

trucks along a street or highway. With long enough exposures, these lights appear as red, white, and yellow 'string' patterns. Depending upon the location, other objects in the frame, amount of traffic, and duration of exposure, you can get some very interesting images.

However, there are various other sources of 'moving light' that we can use for this technique. Some of these sources are carnival lights in Ferris wheels and other moving rides, moving neon signs, fireworks, lightning storms, and even the stars overhead.

For all of these types of moving lights, you need to control the shutter speed so that the exposure time is long enough to capture the movement. You will have to experiment with different times for each situation to figure out which will give you the results that please you. But here are a few suggested settings that you can

start at. (All are for 100 speed film.)

Carnival lights: f32 16s Moving neon signs: f8 2s Moving traffic: f16 20s

Fireworks: f2.8 1-2s

Star Trails: f3.5 2-6hours (not recommended for digital because of the long exposure required to see movement)

Lightning: bulb, expose through set of strikes. (Remember, tripods are great lightning rods. DO NOT work in the middle of a storm. Wait until you can see the lightning off in the distance.)

So if you feel like getting out to shoot after dark, keep an eye out for those moving lights and see what images you can capture.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I'm going to cover a variety of topics that will deal with creative photography and special effects. The topic this month is creative use of filters.

We all know that the 'proper' use of filters, like polarizers and split neutral-density filters, can add to the beauty and impact of our images. But have you ever thought to use your filters to create your own version of reality?

Some filters that can be used creatively are the 81 and 82 series. The 81 series (81A, 81B, and 81C) are amber or yellowish in color and will warm up an image by imparting a yellowish tinge to everything. The 82 series (82A, 82B, 82C) are bluish in color and will cool down an image by imparting a bluish tinge. The A's are the lightest and the C's are the darkest. Try using the yellow filters for sunsets, sunrises, fall colors close-ups. Try using the blue filters for waterscapes, stormy skies, foggy or misty days.

The enhancing filters are similar to the 81 warming filters, except they have little effect on the blues and greens and will only 'warm up' the red/orange colors. Try using these for flower close-ups, fall landscapes, beachscapes and other images that have a mix of 'warm' and 'cool' colors.

There are also special effect filters made by COKIN and other manufacturers. These consist of a holder that screws onto your lens that has 2 or 3 'slots' in front of your lens. You can then slide in one or more 'special effect' filters. Some of the more common ones are:

'star filters' that are crosshatched plastic or glass that will produce 4, 6, 8, or 16 point stars on your image wherever there is a reflection of sun or other light. I saw a very interesting image of a fireplace fire taken with one of these filters.

'soft focus' or diffuser filter that will 'soften' your final image. 'spot in color' filter that is clear in a center ring, but highly diffused outside

'fog' filter that is clear on the bottom half gradually getting more diffused to simulate fog on your final image.

'radial zoom' filter that is clear in a center ring, with etched concentric circles to the end that will produce a zoom-like image.

The challenge with using these types of filters for creative images is to find subjects and structures that will work well with the filters and the image distortions.

For those of you doing digital manipulation, you can also duplicate these efforts on your computer. But just think how more challenging it would be to get these results in camera.

One final caution: use sparingly; a little goes a long way.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I'm going to cover a variety of topics that will deal with creative photography and special effects. Dr. Zhu's presentation last month reminded me of an article I saved from the Oct 2005 issue of Outdoor Photographer that deals with photographers as artists. So I thought I'd share some of the insights and tips from this article with you.

There are differing views as to whether photographers are artists or not. This author's view is that, of course we are. We create our very own interpretation of reality every time we capture an image. Although we all became aware of the basic rules of composition and exposure very early in our lives as photographers, we should also be aware that we can break these rules to create truly creative and imaginative images. The author then goes on to

present 10 tips for breaking the 'rules' to make each image our own. Here are a few of those tips.

- Work a subject; your first shots might not be your best. When you find an interesting subject, stay with it and keep working different angles, different lenses, different filters. You will many times find the unexpected 'great shot' using this technique.
- Look for new ways to show old subjects. Flop down on the ground and see what shots you can get there. Climb up on rocks and shoot down. Incorporate unusual elements in the foreground or as a silhouette.
- Shoot in inclement weather to see what unusual images you can get. He suggested shooting groupings of wildflowers in very windy situations to get a 'Monetlike' image.

- Try 'kaleidoscoping'. The author describes this as setting your zoom lens wide open and zooming through the entire range, capturing images when they look interesting.
- 5. Have fun!!! When you are out breaking the rules, become 'child-like' and have fun taking unusual images. Try to escape from the standard rules of photography. The change from your normal methods of setting up a shot may give you some great new ideas.

If any of these tips sound interesting, try to find the article by Budd Titlow and see what other ideas he has.

But most of all have fun.

Back to the Basics

Each month we will cover some of the basics of photography. This year I'm going to cover a variety of topics that will deal with creative photography and special effects. My topic this month is reflections.

Use of reflections can turn a normal subject into an interesting image because the reflection distorts the subject and adds visual interest. If done creatively, you can add a great deal of impact to an otherwise common subject.

You can find many reflective surfaces for your reflection photographs: water, glass walls or windows, ice, even chrome auto bumpers. Water can be rivers, lakes, or streams, but can also be swimming pools, puddles in the street, or water in culverts and ditches. Each can give you opportunities for interesting shots.

To get a really distorted reflection, you can use mylar film as your reflective surface. You can mount your mylar loosely to a piece of cardboard and take it out in the field and set up your

image so that it is reflected in the mylar. We've already done this in our tabletop sessions, but you can also use this same technique out in the field.

Here are some technical tips for taking reflection photographs:

- Some light is lost on reflections, so the subject and the reflected image never appear equally bright in the final image. Decide which part of the image you want to emphasize and set the exposure for that area.
- In some cases, you may need to use a graduated neutral density filter to get good exposure in both areas.
- A polarizing filter can sometime help reduce the intensity of the reflection on a sunny day and may result in a more pleasing image.
- If your reflective surface is much closer to your camera than the object, you need to make sure that you use a small enough aperture

- so that your subject is in focus. .
- Still water generates an almost identical copy of the real subject. If you'd like a little more distortion, toss pebbles into the water to create ripples and your final image may be more interesting.

Because most reflective surfaces are unstable and variable, you will want to try several different positions with your camera off the tripod to find an angle that gives you the most interesting results. Once you find an angle you like, remount your camera on the tripod and set up your final composition.

So when you are out in the field, look for opportunities to add some impact to your images by trying some of these reflection techniques.





Back to the Basics

Each month I use this column to cover some of the basics of photography. This year I've been covering a variety of topics that deal with creative photography and special effects. I thought I'd wrap up this year with some general thoughts on being creative.

When we start out as photographers, we take the basic classes in composition and the techniques of taking 'good' photographs. As beginners, we try to stay with what we've learned to create acceptable images. But after we achieve some level of competence with this, we need to start taking some risks and breaking

rules to get the truly outstanding images that we are seeking.

With digital cameras, we have the freedom to experiment without the cost of film, developing, and printing. So now we can play with new lenses or filters or techniques we've not used much. We can try unusual compositions that may not work. Try taking some time out in the field playing with some of your seldom-used equipment and see what it can do.

Explore what other artists have done. Visit museums and art galleries, look at magazines and art books. Find images

that appeal to you and see if you can identify what it is about those images that make them special. Then see what you can do to create something similar yourself.

Each of us has his own unique way of looking at the world we live in. Allow yourself to interpret what you see in a way that is most pleasing to you. For the greatest pleasure we can get as photographers is to create a beautiful image that is uniquely

our own.
