Back to the Basics

Each month I will use this column to cover some of the basics of photography. This month I will review how to mark your slide and print entries for competition.

SLIDES:

All slides must be 2"x2" only. Mark a "thumbspot" (a dark circle - I like the little 1/4 inch dots I bought at the map store) on the lower left corner of the slide as you view it. (Normally the shiny side of the slide.) On this same side, put the title and the Class and Category codes (depending upon the competition).

On the other side put your name and address. (Tiny return address labels (Avery 5267—1/2 X 1-3/4) work reasonably well. You should also include your club name for WACCO competitions. The new WACCO rules call for 3 size mats or boards: 8x10, 11x14, and 16x20. No framed prints will be accepted.

Large prints (color or monochrome) must measure larger than 8x12 and be mounted on the 16x20 mat or board.

Small prints can be any size from 3.5x5 up to 8x10 and must be mounted on either a 8x10 or 11x14 mat or board.

On the back clearly mark your name, address, and print title. Also place a large and dark arrow pointing the 'up' direction for the print. Please make sure that this arrow is easily visible in the darkened room where these prints are judged.

DIGITAL:

The digital images should be a maximum of 1024 (Width) x 768

(Height) or 7.5" (Height) x 10" (Width) @ 100dpi. Each should be JPEG format with a maximum file size of 1.4mb. They must be on a CD which should have your Name, Phone number, and E-mail address on it. The images should be put into folders labeled for the category entered (General or Nature). Each image should be labeled with Category, Entry #. Title. Where the category would be "G" for General and "N" for Nature, the entry # from the report card, and the title of the image with an underscore between each item as shown:

Back to the Basics

Over the past year or so, I have started hearing a new 'theme' in photography presentations, classes, and seminars. I've also been seeing this same 'theme' in photography magazine articles. I have grouped these all into a topic I will refer to as "Zen and the Art of Photography". This year, I will use this column to explore this topic and some of its variances.

Our reasons for getting into photography are probably as varied and unique as each of us are as individuals. Some of us are PAS-SIONATE about this art, spending a great deal of our time on it. Some of us think of photography as a casual hobby that we practice when we find time for it or have an opportunity presented to us. Others of us were once interested in, or maybe even passionate about, photography but have found ourselves losing interest in it or spending less and less time practicing.

I hope that some of the information I will present in these columns will help give you a greater understanding of the relationship you have to your images and the options you have to grow as an artist.

Let me start out with a nontechnical definition of 'Zen' so you have a basis for what I will be writing. 'Zen' is a complex philosophy for which there is no simple definition. But one of the many definitions is that Zen celebrates the profound beauty of the commonplace and the extraordinary in the ordinary. Zen values the direct experience above everything else and is concerned mostly with simplicity and naturalness.

As photographers, we attempt to

do these same things with our images. We capture what we see and show our viewers the beauty of our subject by choosing what is in our frame, how it is lighted and exposed, adjusted via process or software, and how it is ultimately presented to the viewer.

Because each of us is unique, each of us will have a different interpretation of what we see and how we make choices to convert that into our images. I am hoping that these columns will help each of you to understand how you approach photography and what you can do to put more of yourself into your images and in doing so, become a better

(and hopefully happier) photographer.

Back to the Basics

My theme for this column this year is "Becoming One with Your Photographs". (See above.) My theme for this month is Putting Emotion in your Photographs.

A snapshot can capture 'what is', but a photograph can capture much more - a feeling or mood, or a reflection of what the photographer was feeling. We need to learn to get past what our eye is seeing and try to understand what our heart is feeling. We need to make our images look like the experience felt. And how do we do this?

Before snapping the shutter, take some time to relate to what you are seeing, how you feel about it. What is it that you want your viewer to see and feel? Maybe before even setting up your camera, you need to take some time to wander around the area and 'get a feel' for what is happening. (And now to the 'zen'-ish view...) All things, both animate and inanimate, have a life of their own. Think of the differences between a modern office building and one built a 100 years ago. Each of them project different images and have different things to offer. Think of the differences between a street in a small Amish village and one in downtown Milwaukee. Each of these streets have a separate and distinct life. We need to give ourselves time to understand the life (and the 'heart') of what we are viewing and then attempt to capture that image.

The weather can also influence how we feel about our subject. A field that is pretty common on a sunny day can appear mystical on a foggy morning. A cloudy sky may appear dull and lifeless until the clouds turn stormy with lightening. Then there is an element of power. What you want to capture are the feelings, and not necessarily just the 'facts'.

We all learned the basics of exposure, composition, and lighting when we first started photographing. To get beyond being a basic photographer, we now need to get beyond the technical basics and start putting more of our selves into our photographs.

I would like to close this column with a quote from Freeman Patterson.

"Seeing, in the finest and broadest sense, means using your senses, your intellect and your emotions. It means encountering your subject matter with your whole being. It means looking beyond the labels of the things and

discovering the remarkable world around you."

Back to the Basics

My theme for this column this year is "Becoming One with Your Photographs". My theme for this month is Photography as Art.

As photographers, we want to get beyond just showing what is on the other side of the camera lens. There is no great challenge in merely putting the camera on automatic and shooting what is there. If this pleased us, we wouldn't have invested in SLR's, multiple lenses and filters, or flash equipment. But, we do buy and use these cameras and accessories because we want to capture more than just what is there. We want to convert what we see into something more esthetically pleasing to us. We want to create art.

When we were beginning photographers, we learned the basic techniques of photography: composition, aperture settings, shutter speeds, and lighting techniques. But to capture artistic photographs, we need to go beyond these basic techniques.

Each of us has our own tastes in art. Some of us like the more 'true to life' images. Some like the totally abstract. And some like the images somewhere in between. We each need to try some new techniques to find those that will help us capture the type of image that we are partial to.

Here are a few sample techniques you might like to try to get a more artistic image.

Shoot through your foreground. If you have an interesting foreground, try getting low and shooting through it rather than over it.

Use a slower shutter speed to capture the feeling of action during sporting events or when wildlife is active. The images will not be sharp, but you may like what you get better.

When shooting in a complex environment, set your zoom lens to wide open and zoom throughout the entire range. Every new focal length shows a completely different image. This technique can work equally as well in fields of flowers as it can by a waterfall.

Have fun. Don't feel restricted by the 'right way' to frame and shoot images. Don't let the process become tedious. Put yourself into the photographing process and allow yourself the freedom to play with the various techniques. The most you can lose is a bit of your

time. But, you may be pleasantly pleased with your results.

Back to the Basics

My theme for this column this year is "Becoming One with Your Photographs". My topic for this month is Motivation.

Some of us are passionate about our photography. But many of us have lost that initial passion we found when we got our first cameras, would like to recapture it, but don't quite know how. I'm hoping that this column will give you a few new things to try that will help. So here are a few ideas I found in a couple different articles:

Put aside your SLR and pick up a simple point-and-shoot. If you don't have one, you probably can borrow one from your kids or grandkids. Or you can pick up an inexpensive one for yourself. Forget all of the tedious technical aspects of photography and just get out and shoot. This may help you find the fun again.

Create your own photography pro-

ject ... sort of like what Steve Reyer did with his "A, B, C ..." poster. Choose a topic or theme that piques your interest and make it your own. Don't try to get too involved. The simpler it is, the better chance you have to complete it. Remember that you want to try to find something interesting enough to get you up and going on those cold Saturday mornings.

Enter photography competitions (other than our twice-a-year-WACCO competitions). Web searches should yield plenty of opportunities. And often the requirement of a competition is to shoot at specific locales ... a chance to shoot somewhere new. (Be careful though. Some competition sponsors require that you turn over all rights to the images you enter.)

Take a photography course, or a nature course, or an architecture

course, or even an art course. In a learning environment, you will pick up lots of new information and ideas from the teacher and from the other students.

Go to your public library or get online and read, read, read. Read about photography, art, architecture, nature, or anything else that interests you. All of this reading is bound to give you some new insights into things. Then take whatever interests you most and see how you can incorporate that into your photography.

Remember that the more you put into any activity, the more you will get out of it. So if you've lost that passion, try putting a little effort into regaining your initial love

for photography.

Back to the Basics

My theme for this column is "Becoming One with Your Photographs". My topic for this month is Reducing Stress Through Photography.

We all live with some stress in our lives. And we all have our own ways to deal with this stress: exercise, relaxation techniques, recreation, or other calming activities. If we can figure out how to get sufficiently involved in the photographic process, we can use this to help reduce our stress levels.

To get to this Zen-like state (or 'flow') with your photography, you need to let go of other distractions and lose yourself in your surroundings. Observe the environment – look and listen and smell and feel with your eyes and your ears and your nose and your heart and your mind, indeed with your entire being. Concentrate on the beauty or the simplicity or the patterns or the color or the grandeur, whatever your heart is 'seeing'.

I have heard this type of process called 'in the moment' or 'relaxed attentiveness'. The basic intent is to lose yourself in the experience, letting go of your inhibitions, worries, or other distractions. This is not always easy, but with practice, can be achieved.

The first thing you need to do is relax. Find some time when you can spend at least an hour without being interrupted. Gather your photographic equipment and find somewhere with a subject that interests you. This could be in your home with an interesting flower arrangement, or it could be in a local park or nature center, or any other place that interests you. Lay your equipment aside and just look at your subject. Ignore other distractions and notice colors, textures, shapes, lighting, movement. Move around to get other views of your subject. Unfocus your eyes, then focus them again and concentrate on all parts of your subject. When you feel like you know your subject, then set up your equipment and shoot what interests you. The main goal of this exercise is to relax and observe your subject, not necessarily to get great photographs.

Once you have tried this exercise several times, it should become easier to 'lose' yourself in the process of observation, hopefully giving you a rest from your daily stress.

We all have enjoyed the dramatic and exotic images that photographers have brought back from their travels. It's all too easy for us to then lose our enthusiasm for shooting the common subjects that are available for us closer to home, even thought we know it is possible to get fantastic images of commonplace things.

With some care, we can all find several local places that can be special to us. First you each need to identify what you enjoy shooting most: architecture, flowers, birds, landscapes, people, or something else. Next you need to do a little research to find several areas close to your home that will

Repeat visits to your special places will help you become more familiar with them. Use some of the techniques from previous months' columns to develop an emotional connection with these places. The change of seasons, weather, and differing times of day will provide a vast variety of subjects for you to shoot. I've heard it said that "any subject worth shooting is worth shooting over and over again". The better we know our subject, the easier it is to make good images.

And because your special places are easily accessible, you won't have to be afraid to take risks and experiment with some new tech-

This will give you a good chance to 'explore' your yard. Try seeing what you can get with your macro lenses. Try 'artistic' images, abstracts, or architecture. Whatever looks interesting.

Depending upon the number and variety of images submitted, he will decide which ones will end up in the final show. But everyone who submits any images will get at least one or two included. Back to the Basics

My theme for this column is "Becoming One with Your Photographs". My topic for this month is Expanding Your Vision.

No matter how much we enjoy any one thing, after a time and with multiple repetitions, it becomes a bit boring, common, and not nearly as enjoyable. Think back to when you bought your last car (or great pair of shoes, or new designer purse, or whatever does it for you). Remember how excited you were to use it the first few times. But after a month or two, you've lost that enthusiasm and no now no longer even give it a second thought.

And so it becomes with your photography when you continue to shoot the same way you always have. Yes, it is true that by continually buying new equipment and accessories, you can maintain the excitement, but there are more economical ways to do this. You can try to find new and exciting ways to use the equipment you already have. There are many articles listing ways we can expand our photographic vision. Here are a few:

Photograph something you've never photographed before. Look for new locations or new subjects. Try photographing at different times of the day – noon or twilight. Or try going out in the fog or in the rain.

Look for patterns or texture to photograph. You can use your normal locations and subjects, but focus way down to small areas where you can see the pattern and texture details.

Ignore the available subjects and look only for shapes and color. Once you have identified the shapes and color that appeal to you, then look again and photograph the parts of the subjects that give you the shapes and color you are looking for.

Try wild experiments. Using digital, it will cost you nothing to fill a card and then erase whatever you do not like. Try shooting with a longer exposure out the side of a car while it is moving. Try doing the same while you are walking.

Try shooting in monochrome if you normally shoot color.

If none of these suggestions appeal to you, I'm sure that you will be able to find some other way to re-energize your enthusiasm for photography by expanding your vision and making it all new and fun again.

Back to the Basics

My theme for this year is "Becoming One with Your Photographs". My topic for this month is Expressing Your Passion.

In order to identify what your passion is, you need to reflect on all of the images you've taken over the years, and the places you've been. You also need to consider images taken by other photographers. Which of these images do you feel most strongly about? Can you group these into one or more categories? If so, then these could be considered your passion. (There's nothing wrong with having more than one passion.) You may then want to concentrate on photographing these types of subjects. If, after reflecting on your past experiences and have not identified any particular passion, perhaps you just haven't found it yet. Keep trying new locations and subjects

until you can find something you can be passionate about.

Once you find subjects that get your creative juices flowing, you need to study those subjects until you find the true essence of that subject. What about the subject makes you passionate: the colors, the shapes, the patterns? The 'life' within the subject? The process that created it? Its relationship to its environment?

When you identify what it is about the subject that is most interesting to you, you then need to concentrate on capturing that in your image. Take the time to study each subject from all angles; try to find the 'heart' of your subject. This should help you determine what you need to include in your final image. Once you feel this emotional connection with your subject, turn on your camera and start shooting.

When you have found a subject and developed that intimate connection with it, then the process of photographing it will take on a life of its own. You will want to experiment with exposure, f-stops, filters, framing, point of view, and other technical aspects to try to capture the passion you have for the subiect.

Alfred Eisenstadt once said "The most important thing is not clicking the shutter; it is clicking with the subject."

Back to the Basics

My theme for this year is "Becoming One with Your Photographs". My topic for this month is Creating Your Own Personal Style.

When I first joined a camera club maybe 5 or 6 years ago, I was amazed that, while we were viewing some images, some club members sitting near me knew immediately who the maker was. I now understand that it had to do with the 'personal style' of the image maker. 'Personal Style' can be defined as the sum of Technique, Subject, and Artistic Expression.

Ansel Adams once said "We don't make a photograph with just a camera; we bring to the act of photography all the books we have read, the movies we have seen, the music we have heard, the people we have loved." Our photographs are a result everything we have done and who we are.

We can learn a lot about photographic style by looking at other photographers' work. But, because we are our own unique person, there is no way we can duplicate the style of any other photographer. To develop your own personal style, you need to figure out what your strengths are and concentrate there.

On the road to creating your own personal style, the first thing you need to perfect is the technical aspects of photography: exposure, f-stops, composition, etc. No matter how experienced you are, it never hurts to review these things. If you have never taken an introduction to photography course, consider doing so. Or get a basic book on photography and review the sections on technique.

Then you need to find subjects that get your 'creative juices' flowing. I covered this in last month's "Expressing Your Passion" topic.

And finally, and most importantly, you need to develop your very own artistic expression; a way to capture the emotion you are feeling about your subject and include that in the final image. You need to find a way to make your image different from other photographers. Only when you can do this, have you created your own personal style.

Back to the Basics

My theme for this year was "Becoming One with Your Photographs". Originally I had titled it "Zen and the Art of Photography", but then found out that there are already several books by that name, so I changed the title of my theme, but not the content.

In my October column, I said that Zen is a complex philosophy for which there is no simple definition. But one of the many definitions is that Zen celebrates the profound beauty of the commonplace and the extraordinary in the ordinary. Zen values the direct experience above everything else and is concerned mostly with simplicity and naturalness.

In other columns I covered emotion, personalization, motivation, reducing stress, vision, passion, and personal style.

I think what I was trying to do with this year's columns was to get each of us to think about our relationship with photography, what we expect to get out of it, what we are willing to put into it, and how it adds to our enjoyment of life.

In the complexities of our daily lives, we face various sources of stress, anxiety, and conflict. Photography is one way that we can leave these complexities behind us, at least for a few hours, and instead concentrate on the beauty and wonders of the world around us, and using our photographic skills, capture those images to share with others.

Nirvana (which is considered the

goal of Zen) is often defined as a blissful release from the limitations of this physical life and a emotional connectedness between our own selves and the universe. And isn't this exactly what is happening when we are out with our cameras attempting to capture what we are seeing?

I wish each of you an enjoyable photographic journey over the summer. Take some time to really enjoy the process. And remember: Any day with a camera around your neck is a good day.
