A Message from our Club President

Hello Club Members:

Wisconsin is the state of opportunity for photographers of all levels -- amateurs, hobbyists, and professional. What state has a National Wildlife refuge with over 223 species of birds? Of course that would be Wisconsin.

The Horicon National Wildlife Refuge is the result of the work of a glacier that covered this part of Wisconsin some 70,000 years ago. When it receded about 12,000 years ago, it carved out a shallow lake bed which is now the Horicon Marsh.

The refuge is made up of about 21,000 acres. This is the only network of lands primarily dedicated to the preservation and management of fish and wildlife resources. The Horicon National Wildlife refuge supports the largest nesting population of redhead ducks east of the Mississippi River, Thousands of redheads use the marsh each year. Essential habitat is provided for trumpeter swans, great egrets, Forster's tern, peregrine faicons and bald eagles. The American white breeding pelicans have made their way back to Wisconsin, the exact count is not known as of this writing.


It is estimated that about 400,000 people visit Horicon refuge each year enjoying the various hiking trails, floating boardwalk and more.

On my last visit to the marsh, I photographed egrets, cormorants, a green heron, Foster's tern, and a family of American coots. I hope that you visit the marsh. Happy Shooting!

A Message from our Club President

Hello Club Members:

Do you enjoy photographing butterflies? I do. Part of the adventure is the quest to finally get one in a resting position. Perhaps if you do, you have noticed a decline in butterflies and in particular monarchs. Much of this is due to herbicides.

Milkweeds and nectar sources are declining due to development and the widespread use of herbicides in croplands, pastures and roadsides.

Development of the land for subdivisions, factories, shopping centers in the U.S. consumes habitat for monarchs and other wildlife at a rate of 6,000 acres (9.4 square miles) a day which amounts to 2.2 million acres per year. This is roughly equivalent to losing an area of habitat the size of the state of Illinois.

Widespread adoption of herbicide-

resistant corn and soybeans has resulted in the loss of more that 80 million acres of monarch habitat in recent years. The planting of these crops genetically modified to resist the non-selective systemic herbicide glyphostate (Roundup) allows growers to spray fields with this herbicide instead of tilling to control weeds.

What you can do? To offset the loss of milkweeds and nectar sources we need to create, conserve, and protect monarch butterfly habitats. You can help by creating "Monarch Waystations" in home gardens, at schools, business, parks, zoos, nature centers, along roadsides, and on other unused plots of land. This is easily done by adding milkweeds and nectar sources.


The best time for photographing butterflies is in the early morning

when temperatures are fairly low and butterflies are just warming up. Wherever you live-- city or suburb, near mountains or at the shore, you will find butterfly watching a pleasurable and engrossing experience. There are many locations to capture these beauties, from your own backyard, to the Monarch trail at the Milwaukee County grounds, or even faraway places like Luverne, lowa, Delta county upper Michigan, or the areas in the mountains near El Rosario Mexico, Happy shooting before man destroys this great mystery of nature.

Back to the Basics

The past 2 months, Michael Matusinec has used this column for a letter to our members. This month I will review how to mark your slide, print, and digital entries for competition.

SLIDES:

All slides must be 2"x2" only. Mark a "thumbspot" (a dark circle) on the lower left corner of the slide as you view it. On this same side, put the title and the Class and Category codes (depending upon the competition).

On the other side put your name and address. You should also include your club name for WACCO competitions.

DIGITAL:

The digital images should be a

maximum of 1024 (Width) x 768 (Height) or 7.5" (Height) x 10" (Width) @ 100dpi. Each should be JPEG format with a maximum file size of 1.4mb. They must be on a CD which should have your Name, Phone number, and E-mail address on it. The images should be put into folders labeled for the category entered (General or Nature). Each image should be labeled with Category, Entry #, Title. Where the category would be "G" for General and "N" for Nature, the entry # from the report card, and the title of the image with an underscore between each item as shown:

Example:

G_1_Milwaukee Art Museum.jpeg


PRINTS:

The WACCO rules call for 2 size mats or boards: 11x14 or 16x20. No framed prints will be accepted.

Large prints (color or monochrome) must measure between 8x12 and 16x20 and be mounted on a 16x20 mat or board.

Small prints can be any size from 3.5x5 up to 8x10 and must be mounted on a 11x14 mat or board.

On the back clearly mark your name, address, and print title.
Also place a large and dark arrow pointing the 'up' direction for the print. Please make sure that this arrow is easily visible in the darkened room where these prints are judged.

My Favorite Place to Shoot by Michael Matusinec:

Perhaps one of my all time favorite places to shoot is the Kletzsch Park dam area in Glendale.

The Kletzsch historians say that the Glendale area was once inhabited by Pottawatomie Indians. It has been said there are burial grounds along the Milwaukee River as it winds through the park. Kletzsch Park became one of the most popular parks in the county park system during the early 1920's with a river, swimming beach, and picnic area.

Kletzsch Park was greatly improved with the use of relief labor. A Civilian Conservation Corps camp was established in Kletzsch Park from May through November, 1935.

The CCC projects completed included a new dam built across the Milwaukee River. The new structure, built of reinforced concrete in a serpentine design to lengthen the crest, provided increased discharge capacity without widening the river. Models, prepared by the landscape design section of the planning department, served as guides in erecting the stone facing and the fish ladder built into the face of the dam. The dam has the appearance of a natural waterfall.

From the President's Desk

The Civil War was one of the most violent periods in the history of the United State. It was in many ways the first industrial war, and it helped define the United States as a country.

Photography was some 20 years old at the beginning of the American Civil War. Mathew Brady was the most famous of the Civil War Photographers. His teams would go out in specially made wagons lugging the very heavy cameras of the day. The cameras hurriedly move to treat the plate before it dried out and then chemically transfer it to either tin-

plate or paper. You would to stand or sit very still for about 30 seconds in the good daylight to have your picture taken during the Civil War.

Bull Run gave Americans the first photographs of the war taken by Mathew Brady. Brady had hoped that a grateful nation would pay him handsomely for his efforts. But once the war was over, the public spurned the harrowing images the photographer had taken such risks to obtain. Even the sales of his achieve did not prevent Brady from dying penniless, and largely unac-

knowledged in 1896.

I have been to Gettysburg, it is very moving, and easy to remember what happen to our county during that period of history. The estimated that the number solders that lost there lives, 620,000. When traveling out East, Gettysburg is a must stop, capture this historical site in your hearts and with you camera.


March Meeting

From the President's Desk

During a photo shoot at the Classic Car Show at the lake front in August, my Canon EOS 40D gave me an ER-ROR 99 message. The message reads "shooting is not possible turn the power switched to Off and On again or re-install the battery." Timing could not have been not been worse.

This happened after every shot I took. Needless to say it was very frustrating. I decided to change batteries, no luck; then I changed memory cards, still no luck; then I changed Canon lenses, no luck again. The code error 99 followed me around like a bad habit. I quit taking images after three

hours. I missed a lot of opportunities.

When I got home, I called Canon Technical support and told them what had happen and all the steps I took to correct. The Canon EOS 40D had frozen, it would not take any pictures no matter what I tried. On August 26 I had to send my camera to the Canon hospital. I got nervous without a good SLR camera, so I went out and bought a Canon EOS 50D.

On September 12, I got a message from Canon that a part was bent causing an error to be displayed. Canon replaced the shutter assembly

and dial assembly part, adjusted exposure and focus, cleaned the cmos sensor and checked all factory specifications. This all added up to a cost of \$211.20.

This error was very frustrating. I am having my cameras cleaned once a year by the experts and I clean my lenses every time I go out on a shoot. How many of our members have had this ERROR 99? What have our members done to protect their priceless equipment?

History of the SLR

The ability of photography to capture a moment is what makes it so powerful. Strong photographs-whether they depict the national news or a love one's high school graduationare able to tell us all kinds of things about the world around us.

Nowadays, within a matter of minutes, a mother can photograph her child and e-mail the pictures to family and friends half way around the world. News agencies can post images on the internet as a breaking news story is taking place. In this day and age, pic-

tures are basic units of information for all of us.

When you look at your sophisticated digital SLR, it's hard to imagine that the age of photography is only about 160 years old and the modern single lens reflex camera only a little over 50 years.

Prototype SLRs popped up in the early 20th century, but it wasn't until the 1950s that they became popular. At that point, the SLR became the camera of the choice for people with a serious interest in photography.


The SLR uses mirrors or prism so that the photographer can look into the viewfinder and

see directly through the lens.




May Meeting

From the President's Desk

Wisconsin's northernmost tip touches the mighty lake named 'Superior', a source of many photographic opportunities. Known to the Native American Ojibwe people who first populated the area as 'Gichegami' or 'big water' (sometimes spelled Gitche Gumee), Lake Superior is the largest freshwater lake in the world. Covering more than 31,700 square miles, it is the deepest and coldest of the Great Lakes. This immense lake measures more than 382 miles in length and 160 miles in width, covering in excess of 2,700 miles of shoreline. The lake is an average of nearly 489 feet deep with a maximum depth of 1,279 feet and contains 3 quadrillion gallons of

water.

Probably discovered by the French explorer Etienne Brule, one of Samuel de Champlain's scouts in the early 1620's, Superior's waves wash beaches and shorelines that contain half of all the water in the Great Lakes. More than an eight of the earth's fresh water is contained here. The lake rarely freezes over, but ice along the shores closes its ports from approximately December to April.

My favorite Lake Superior spots are: Big Bay, Copper Harbor, and Whitefish Point in the UP of Michigan, Duluth's Aerial Lift Bridge, Gooseberry Falls, Split Rock Park and Lighthouse in Minnesota, and the Apostle Islands in Wisconsin.

The Lake Superior Circle Tour has 1,300 miles to explore and enjoy. (Special note: fastest verified circle time 21 hours, done legally by motorcycle.)

I hope you find time this summer to drive up and see parts of it for yourself.

From the President's Desk

US Lighthouse History

The oldest surviving original lighthouse in the Continental United State is at Sandy Hook, New Jersey. It is still active and was built in 1764, when New Jersey was still a colony of England.

The First public project funded by the US government was a lighthouse. The Cape Henry Light was constructed in Chesapeake Bay in 1792.

At a Lighthouse in the Pacific Northwest, a neighbor's bull kept charging the fog horn, no doubt thinking its bellowing was a competing bull.

Kate Walker, a widow and lighthouse keeper at Robbins Reef in New York Harbor, rescued at least 50 people over the years of her duty there. In addition to maintaining the lighthouse, keeping the light burning and rescuing mariners in distress, she raised two sons, rowing them a mile each day to Staten Island to attend school. (I wonder if they had SNOW days?)

Tom Small, who tended Deer Island Light in Boston Bay with his brother, had a aquatic cat that would climb the lighthouse ladder, leap into the sea to fish and return on the ladder with the catch in her mouth.

World Lighthouse History

The first known lighthouse was one of the original Seven Won-

ders of the Ancient World. Built the island of Pharos in the Mediterranean Sea off Egypt in the 3rd Century B.C., it was 450 feet tall and covered with elaborate carvings. Its signal was an open fire.

The oldest active lighthouse in the world today is near La Corunna, Spain, and was built by the Romans about 2,000 years ago. During the Roman Empire it was known as the Tower of Hercules.

The State of Wisconsin has a wealth of information concerning our lighthouses. Facts about Lighthouses are extremely interesting, it gives you an idea of what keepers had to do for such little pay, it any at all.

Model Shoot Guidelines

Here are some of the basic guidelines for shooting models. Please follow these at our June Model Shoot.

- 1 Communication with your model is critical to getting the image you want. You may never touch your model or adjust his/her clothing or hair. You must ask the model to make any changes you want.
- Constant instruction is critical to let your model know if he/she should hold
 the pose or make changes. Keep a close eye on the model's clothes and
 hair and have him/her adjust as necessary. Remember to be kind when
 making comments. A happy model will result in better pictures.
- 3. Do not invade the model's personal space. Use lenses that will allow you to shoot from at least 6 feet away.
- Do not dominate the model's time. There are other club members waiting for their turn
- 5. When selecting images to give to the model, make sure you choose the most flattering poses.

For this photo shoot, there will not be any model releases given to individuals. The model releases will be retained by the club. This shoot is meant to be a learning experience for our members and is not to be used for profit.

Please remember that if you participate in the model shoot, you will be expected to turn 5-10 images of each model on a CD that are full resolution image-ready (jpeg, tiff, or PSD). Each model should be in an individual folder. Please email these CD's to Jeff Klug, PO Box 376, Hubertus, WI 53033-0376 by June 14th.

From the President's Desk

Sunrise and Sunset

Have you ever been asked "How did you capture such a dramatic sky?" I would answer this question by saying I study the light and practice, practice, practice. I have some additional thoughts and tips on this subject.

GOOD TIMING: Everyone loves sunrise and sunset, but do we know the differences? Sunrise usually brings colder light with a blue-and-magenta color scheme. And you better work fast, as you have only a few minutes to shoot. Sunsets? Typically a much warmer

light with lots of red.

BAD WEATHER: Keep your eye on the forecast for changes. Rain, hail, or snow coming or going are almost guaranteed to bring dramatic light.

CLOUD FORMATIONS: Study how various types of clouds reflect light and colors during the golden hour around sunset. A sky full of hazy clouds kills all color, while big fluffy cotton balls light up on fire especially just after a rain.

EXPOSURE: There are a

range of correct exposures, if your camera has a built-in meter, you will usually be way off because the sky is still relatively bright, and the meter will underexpose the image. Best approach is to try meter the ambient level of light. To do this either take and incident-light reading or take your gray card reading. Both approaches will usual give a proper exposure.

COME BACK: Most of us have a favorite location. Shoot there often and study the light. That experience can be the best teacher.

From the President's Desk

As the departing president, my word of advice to all of you is don't leave home without an essential item. If you're going on a field photo shoot for a day or a week, I believe that a check list can help insure the success of your experience.

Do research on the location that is your destination. Ask yourself what type of shooting am I doing? (Wildlife, lighthouses, flowers?)

An equipment check list is a necessity. Things that might be included on such a list are battery charger, batteries for camera and flash, busi-

ness cards, camera(s), cell phone or personal communicator, diffuse collapsible, dime, electronic flash, exposure meter, extra body cap and rear lens cap, memory cards, filters, flash light, liquid hand cleaner, gray card, GPS, lenses, lens shade, instruction manual, lenscleaning supplies, plastic zip lock bags small, sunscreen, bug spray, Swiss Army knife or mini tool kit, tripod, water bottle, and sunscreen. Make a copy of your check list and check them off as you put them in your camera bag.

Here is an additional suggestion, I have made a medical

book and it is in my car at all times. Its contents include my medical history, the meds that I currently take, doctor contacts, plus other important medical information. Always tell someone what area you will be shooting.

It has been my honor to serve you as President for the past year. I have enjoyed my tenure, and had fun serving the Menomonee Falls Camera Club.
